



Summary of Verdant Program Funding Requests in the Pipeline

Access to Healthcare Programs

1. Community Health Center (CHC) of Snohomish County - Dental Program: CHC is establishing a program that will use University of Washington dental residents to serve uninsured adults at its South Everett clinic location. CHC is exploring ways the program could target South County residents, particularly those individuals served by their Lynnwood location and new Edmonds clinic that will open in 2014.

Status: CHC developing concept.

 Dawson Place – Program to decrease ACES: Dawson Place Child Advocacy Center is a non-profit serving child victims of sexual or physical abuse in Snohomish County. In 2012 Dawson Place applied for funding from Verdant. Dawson Place is interested in reworking an application more focused on healthcare access for childhood victims of abuse, and to focus on reducing Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES).

Status: Rework previous application.

3. South County Sobering Center/Detox Program: A program to serve South County patients dealing with acute alcohol or drug intoxication or withdrawal. A committee including insurers, EMS, police, Snohomish County Human Services, Swedish/Edmonds and others is developing an alternative sobering center and detox facility concept where individuals could be served and referred to treatment options and other social services.

The 12-16 bed facility would be located in South Snohomish County and Verdant is being asked to consider providing a commitment to the facility within the range of \$300,000-\$400,000 per year for a period of five years. Snohomish County Human Services is considering a similar funding level, and other participants like insurers and medical providers are being asked for support. The program would be managed by a non-profit service provider through an RFP process.

Status: Concept paper submitted with \$300,000-\$400,000 annual request.

4. Snohomish County Fire District 1 – Community Paramedic Program: a pilot project that would dispatch a single paramedic to handle non-emergency calls made to 9-1-1 and use the paramedic to make prevention visits to frequent 9-1-1 callers.

Status: Application for funding expected within next few months.

Prevention and Education/Empowerment Programs

1. Alzheimer's Association: funding to support and education programs for families and individuals suffering from Alzheimer's. Program ideas include support programs for individuals in the early stage of the disease, caregiver support, promotion of healthy behaviors that decrease risk factors, and policy/advocacy work.

Status: Application for funding expected within next few months.

2. American Cancer Society - Workplace Wellness: a worksite wellness program run in partnership with the University of Washington that targets small employer groups. The program would provide the employer with a wellness assessment and builds on work ACS and the UW have completed in other WA communities.

Status: Application for funding expected within next few months.

3. City of Mountlake Terrace/ Mountlake Terrace Youth Sports Association facilities improvement: the Youth Sports Association is interested in seeking funding for field improvements, including the installation of field turf on underutilized spaces within the city.

Status: Application for funding expected within next few months.

4. North Sound Church - Faith Based Wellness Program: a pilot project to provide wellness programming, including biometrics, health risk assessments, and biometric testing through houses of worship. **Status:** Application for funding expected in April.

5. Wonderland Development Center: early intervention programs and parent support for children with developmental delays or disabilities. Status: Application for funding expected within next few months.

Policy and Advocacy Programs

1. University of Washington - Promoting Community-Based Walking for older adults: the University's Health Promotion Research Center is interested in promoting neighborhood-based walking, whether in walking groups or through independent walking. The concept is to provide walking maps that highlight safe and pleasant routes for walking near homes and other destinations, such as senior centers, training older adults to become advocates for built environment change, and organizing walking groups.

Status: Application for funding expected within the next few months.

Event Description

The purpose of this program is to help South Snohomish County residents improve their health and well-being. In 2012, nearly 500 people took part, and our goal in 2013 is to reach even more people and to demonstrate a measurable improvement in participants' health. In 2012, participants who did biometrics dropped an average of 13 points for their total cholesterol and increased self-reported exercise time. The program will be facilitated by Joe Piscatella, one of the country's leading experts on lifestyle and health issues. Joe brings his unique perspective as a 30+ year survivor of cardiac bypass surgery, and he has conducted similar programs around the U.S. with great success. Held over a period of six weeks, the sessions are structured as a series of seminars led by Joe and local subject experts such as dietitians, chefs and exercise physiologists.
