Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, was called to order at 8:00 a.m. by President Langer.

Approval of Minutes Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the minutes of the regular meeting on May 25, 2016.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the minutes of the special meeting on June 17, 2016.

Executive Committee

President Langer reported that the Executive Committee met on June 17, 2016 to review the June 22, 2016 board meeting agenda, and to meet with Waldron, the search firm for the Superintendent position as they build a candidate profile. President Langer requested that Commissioner Wilson connect with Waldron.

Board Finance Committee

The committee met on June 16, 2016. Ms. King reviewed the financial statements and cash activity for May 2016 (E:40:16). Warrant #11698 in the amount of \$17,062.64 to

Moss Adams for the 2015 audit was called out. Ms. King noted two large deposits, one on May 10, 2016 in the amount of \$864,668.28 from Snohomish County for the levy and another on May 5, 2016 in the amount of \$183,190.00 from Washington State Health Care Authority for the final 2007 CPE settlement.

Authorization for Payment of Vouchers & Payroll Warrant Numbers 11678 through 11715 for May 2016 for payment in the amount of \$66,480.04 were presented for approval (E:41:16). *Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve.* 

Resolution 2016:04 Surplus Personal Property Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Resolution 2016:04 determining certain personal property to be surplused and no longer required for public hospital district purposes of the District.

Committee
Update

The Program Committee met on June 15, 2016 to follow-up on two applications (E:42:16).

No conflicts of interest were reported by any of the commissioners present.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the Foundation for Edmonds School District's Nourishing Network Summer Meals Program in the amount of \$8,400 on a one-time basis to support a summer meals program for children in the Edmonds School District. Funds will be used to provide staff oversight over the activities, not for the actual meals, which will be provided by the YMCA. Commissioners requested a follow-up report on the program after its conclusion.

The other follow-up is for the Mercy Housing – Health in Housing program, a multi-year request at \$180,000 per year for three years. Commissioner Williams would like to see a possible partnership between this program and UW Bothell students in their health studies program. Commissioners discussed the health indicators that they would like to see measured through this program, partnering with MCOs in the area, obtaining publishable results for future agency use. Commissioners request a study session with the various entities who will be involved (insurance companies, North Sound ACH, UW Bothell) to explore funding and partnerships.

Ms. Waldin presented an update on activities in the Verdant Community Wellness Center for April (E:43:16) and called out the Knee & Back Pain class with 42 participants on May 25, 2016, the Mediterranean Diet Learn & Taste Series with 86 participants held on June 6, 13, and 16, 2016, and the NAMI film on anxiety & depression held on June 17, 2016 with 20 participants.

Summer programming will include the topic of mindfulness and a support group for LGBTQ youth.

### Marketing Report

Ms. Piplic presented the Marketing report (E:44:16) highlighting the South County Walks this summer. There are a total of 40 walks throughout the summer and incentive prizes have been donated. Upcoming events include those where Verdant is a participant and/or a sponsor.

### Superintendent's Report

Superintendent Zapora reported on three items:

- At the recent WorkSource Center dedication in Lynnwood, Mayor Smith of the City of Lynnwood acknowledged Verdant's facilitation in keeping a Work Source center in south county.
- 2. Swedish Edmonds had a grand opening for the urgent care center on June 16, 2016. Ms. Sarah Zabel of Swedish Edmonds commented that services will begin ramping up at this new facility.
- 3. An article on Ms. Rowena Miller of the League of Women Voters is in the latest issue of the Senior Focus publication by Senior Services Snohomish County.

Presentation by ARCADD, Inc. on Value Village property Dr. Hisham Ashkouri shared a presentation on a possible medical office building combined with a Starwood hotel on the Value Village property in Edmonds (E:45:16). President Langer thanked Dr. Ashkouri for the presentation and noted that the board was not taking any action today.

### Public Comments

Ms. Sarah Zabel, VP of operations for Swedish Edmonds, updated the commissioners on hospital matters including the opening of the urgent care clinic, the upcoming medical imaging, short-stay unit, cath lab, and radiology lab buildings and that the hospital performed well in the latest regulatory licensing surveys.

### Commissioner Comments

Commissioner Williams commented that the quality control surveyors were impressed with Swedish Edmonds' organization and quality control efforts. Commissioners Meeting June 22, 2016 Page 4

Verdant received dividends payments of \$54,395 offset by an unrealized loss of \$33,553 on our investment portfolio in May and closed with an ending market value of \$34,889,950.

Annual program commitments total \$6,334,738 and \$3,780,015 for 2016 and 2017, respectively. \$1,365,262 remains available to spend in 2016, of which \$38,087 is earmarked as Superintendent Discretionary.

Additional income of \$115,223 and expenses of \$64,405 from the Kruger Clinic were incurred, netting to an additional operating income of \$50,818 in May.

### June 2016 Program Summary

- No new funding applications were received this month
- Follow-up on two applications for review and action today
- Building Healthy Community Funds Applications are due June 30, 2016

### **Programs for Follow-Up and Decision**

1. Foundation for Edmonds School District — Nourishing Network Summer Meals Program: a one-time request for \$8,400 to support a summer meals program for children in the Edmonds School District. The request would support staff oversight, documentation, and healthy activities to correspond with the meals, and the program would serve 30-50 students per day over eight weeks.

At the regular May meeting, the Verdant board asked for more information about the program, including clarification on how Verdant funds would be used, and whether the funding could be tied to health outcomes rather than for the food provided. The Foundation confirmed that funds are not needed for the actual meals—the YMCA will be providing food at no cost. The church space is also being donated. Funds are being requested from Verdant to provide the daily staff oversight and to oversee the site activities. The program will include education and activities on fitness and nutrition and the program would track the number of students participating in physical activities and test pre/post session knowledge about nutrition.

The program committee is bringing the request back to the Verdant board for discussion about whether to fund the project.

2. Mercy Housing – Health in Housing Program: a request for \$180,000 per year for three years that would implement health programs at 7 affordable housing complexes in Verdant's District. The program is modeled after a project Mercy ran in partnership with the King County Housing Authority using Community Health Promoters, with the goal to address health disparities and social determinants of health. Most of the funding (\$140,000) would be dedicated to staffing costs, including 2.5 FTE Community Health Promoters/Coordinators. The programs expects to serve 800 residents per year.

At the regular May board meeting Verdant heard a presentation from Mercy Housing that addressed:

- 1. The health outcomes from a similar project Mercy Housing ran in partnership with King County Housing Authority;
- 2. How Mercy Housing will interact with health insurance payers like the Medicaid MCOs;
- 3. The expected resident profile (age, income, health insurance status) that they hope to engage.

Information from the presentation and some additional background on Mercy follows on the next several pages. The program committee is bringing the request back to the Verdant board for discussion about whether to fund the project.

### **Bringing Health Home Snohomish Project Summary:**

MHNW will partner with the YMCA and the Housing Authority of Snohomish County (HASCO) to implement **Bringing Health Home Snohomish** at seven affordable housing communities in south Snohomish County, home to approximately 1450 total residents. We anticipate providing services to at least 800 in the first year. The program will employ Community Health Promoters (CHPs) to provide culturally and linguistically competent prevention and wellness services to low-income residents. MHNW will provide in-kind support to the project with culturally-specific programming carried out by our diverse resident services team, which includes language proficiency in Vietnamese, Russian, Amharic, Somali and Spanish. We hope that we will be able to bring further services and education opportunities to different cultural groups at the Verdant Wellness Center.

### 1. Results/health outcomes from our project in King County

We have seen a positive change in residents' health behaviors as a result of our efforts, such as:

- 70% of residents engaged with 12,000 Health & Wellness efforts
- Routine check-ups have increased from 85% to 90%
- 93% of the residents at these properties are now insured; 79% of the uninsured households we identified and to whom we provided direct assistance resulted in them become insured.
- Strong correlation between engagement in prevention classes and increased consumption of fruit & vegetables
- Increase in number of residents attached to a PCP from 80% to 82%
- 51 cancer screenings for skin and breast cancer

MHNW uses a robust database where we can track resident / community member participation and types of services utilized. We are able to access and evaluate this data in real-time which helps us identify which services are most popular and having impact. In addition, we conducted an Annual Resident Survey of our four partner properties owned by King County Housing Authority and InterIm Community Development Association (Cottonwood, Samaki Commons, Southwood Square, and Windsor Heights) where we have had onsite Community Health Workers since 2014.

We attribute this success to ongoing resident engagement and establishing trusted relationships with residents early on, as well as increased cultural empathy and languages spoken by Resident Services staff. We hope that our next survey (in August) will show even more positive results since we will have had a full 12-month cycle between the last survey and the new 2016 survey.

### 2. Interactions with Medicaid MCOs on this type of project

### Current:

 All 5 MCOs have participated in MHNW sponsored Health and Resource Fairs. The MCOs have supported our health & wellness efforts by partnering with us to make health screenings and flu shots available on site at the properties. We continue to invite their participation going forward and we continue to look for obvious health and housing opportunities.

### Future:

 We will also look to find alignment between our work and health outcomes important to the MCO's to simplify and make these services most accessible to our residents (MCOs members) in an organized and cost-saving way. The most recent example of a partnership like this is with

Molina. At our request, they ran the addresses of our properties and found that they had a very high number of their members living at MHNW properties. Molina and MHNW are now looking to pilot a couple of programs to see if we can build a stronger partnership, and Molina will rerun the address information and conduct a "deeper dive" into the chronic disease issues and high costs associated with the residents at those properties. Sharing this information in aggregate, we will then work together to improve resident health (through health education and prevention activities) and decrease costs.

 We are also looking to see if it makes sense for MHNW to become a Health Home partner based on MCO data information and property address information.

### 3. Expected resident profile

- 6 of 7 target properties in Snohomish County are family properties and one senior property.
   The senior property is directly behind the Verdant Community Wellness Center.
- Estimated demographics at this time include:
  - o 63% Female, 38% Male
  - 63% Caucasian; 13% Hispanic/Latino; 13% Asian American; 6% African American; 3%
     Other; 1% Native American/Alaska Native; 1% Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander; 1%
     Unknown
  - o 13% Age 0-5; 23% Age 6-17; 18% Age 18-24; 38% Age 25-65; 10% Age 65+
  - o 81% live in Verdant Health's district map; 19% live in other parts of Snohomish County
  - o 93% are Low-Income; 6% are Moderate Income; and 1% are Above Moderate Income
  - o 75% have public health insurance (ex. Medicaid, Basic Health, etc.); 13% are uninsured; 13% have private Insurance
- YMCA sites -- Family Village Lynnwood, Trinity and Pathways feature primary languages of English and Spanish, though FVL has a variety of other languages spoken.
- HASCO sites feature multiple languages Bristol Square (primarily English and Spanish); Robin Park (Ukrainian, Bosnian, Mandarin, Vietnamese, Cantonese, Korean, English); and Whispering Pines (English, Spanish, Vietnamese, Chines, Korean).
- The HASCO properties identified do not have these types of services currently. There is one resource person from Senior Services of Snohomish County at the senior building but services are limited to "information and referral" and a nutrition class. We are not looking to duplicate any services but will instead work in direct partnership to increase access to services not currently available to the residents.
- The MHNW program model guides our service delivery. Our experience in the south King County project shows the can be easily transferred to non-Mercy owned sites. We will start programming based on the model, but as we build relationships with the residents we will conduct Community Cafes that will allow us to assess the needs of the communities and get feedback on what health and wellness areas are most important to the residents. This will also allow us to assess the insurance enrollment rates and general understanding health and insurance systems.

### **Background on Mercy Housing Northwest's Housing-Health Work**

MHNW is a leader in the affordable housing sector in seeking to create and test effective approaches promoting health for low-income affordable housing residents.

Prevention and Management of Chronic Disease in Low-Income and Immigrant Populations through Housing-based and Community Health Worker Interventions in King County



We know that affordable housing is a platform for health and wellness. A recent study conducted by the Center for Outcomes Research & Education (CORE) sampled 10,000 residents in Portland affordable housing. Looking at 148 housing projects that are home to 10,000 residents, the study found a 12% average reduction in Medicaid expenditures after residents moved into affordable housing. Our goal is to carry this research further by refining and measuring the impact of integrated health and prevention services in affordable housing and in low-income communities that have disproportionately poor

health outcomes. After residents move into affordable housing, we see the following positive health outcomes: better connection to primary care, fewer emergency department visits, improved access to and quality of care, and lower costs.

MHNW has been a convener of a statewide Affordable and Public Housing-Health Work Group for the past two years. The purpose is to develop sustainable, scalable approach to housing-based health and wellness efforts. Membership includes representatives from State Health Care Authority, DOH, MCOs, housing authorities from Spokane, Tacoma, Seattle and King County, funders such as Boeing and Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, and other public health and housing experts. Our CHP approach in South King County has been widely successful in serving very diverse low-income residents living in King County Housing Authority affordable housing. 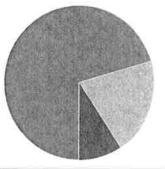

### Bringing Health Home Snohomish

### **Detailed Description of Proposed Services**

Mercy Housing Northwest, in partnership with the YWCA and the Housing Authority of Snohomish County will implement a wide range of health education, prevention and wellness services to low-income residents of seven affordable housing communities in south Snohomish County. Culturally-competent Community Health Promoters will work to build relationships of trust and engage residents in activities designed to address health disparities and improve their overall health. Examples include:

- Regular biometric health screenings MHNW will contract with ScreenPointe, a Washington-based biometric screening provider, to provide screenings for Glucose, BMI, blood pressure and Lipoproteins/triglycerides. ScreenPointe will store resident data and provide aggregate reports to the project for evaluation. Residents will be encouraged to share results with their primary care provider.
- Adult immunizations the project will partner with managed care organizations to provide influenza, shingles and pneumonia immunization events at participating housing sites.
- Best Practice programs
  - Chronic Disease Self-Management a six-week peer support program developed by researchers at Stanford University
  - o A Matter of Balance fall prevention for seniors
  - Women Take Heart 8-week women's heart health curriculum developed by Hope Heart Institute

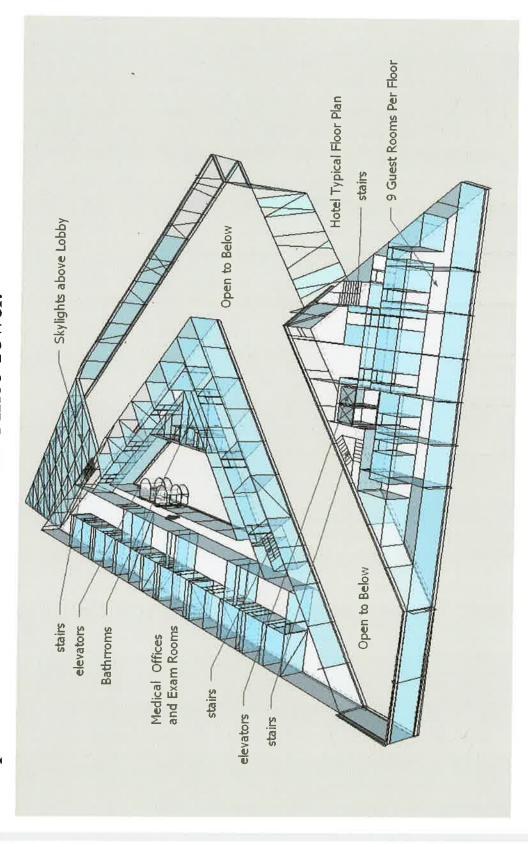

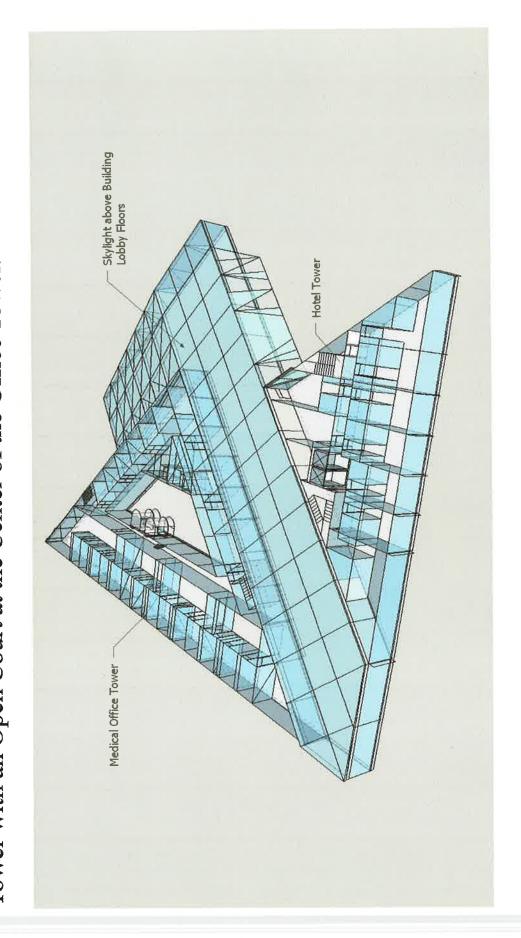

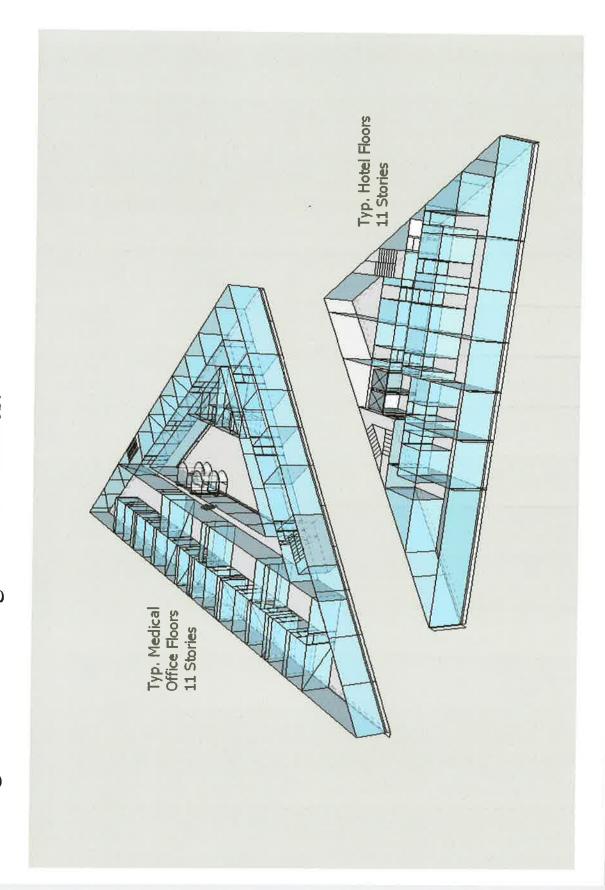

### Washington's public hospitals must provide abortions on site

SEATTLE — A Washington state judge says public hospitals must provide abortions on-site if they also offer maternity services.

The ruling from Skagit County Superior Court Judge Raquel Montoya-Lewis on Tuesday concerned Skagit Valley Hospital, which routinely refers patients to Planned Parenthood when they seek abortions. The American Civil Liberties Union of Washington sued the hospital in 2015 as part of a campaign to make sure public health care facilities follow the state's abortion rights law.

The hospital argued that it was willing to have abortions performed on-site, but that it doesn't have staff members who are willing to provide the services. State law allows health-care providers to optout of providing abortions, but the judge said that doesn't give the entire hospital a right not to offer abortions.

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
