Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, was called to order at 8:03 a.m. by President Langer.

Approval of Minutes Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to

approve the minutes of the regular meeting on

September 23, 2015.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to

approve the minutes of the special meeting on

September 29, 2015.

Executive Committee

President Langer reported that the Executive Committee met on October 22, 2015 in two sessions (one with President

Langer & Superintendent Zapora and one with

Commissioner Knutsen & Superintendent Zapora) to review and approve the October 28, 2015 board meeting agenda

and to review an indoor sports facility plan.

Board Finance Committee The committee met on October 20, 2015. Ms. King reviewed the financial statements and cash activity for September 2015 (E:65:15). Ms. King noted that \$4.5 million has been spent on programs in 2015. President Langer clarified that "spent" equals "invested."

Authorization for Payment of Vouchers & Payroll Ms. King called out the following items:

- 1. Warrant 11337 in the amount of \$33,416.10 to Healthcare Realty for oversight of construction repairs related to the flood claim in April 2015 at the Kruger Clinic. This amount will be reimbursed by the district's insurance company.
- 2. Payment in the amount of \$200,000 to Evergreen Recovery Centers for a detox facility.
- 3. Per the lease agreement, the Swedish Edmonds lease payment increased by 3% effective September 1, 2015.

Warrant Numbers 11306 through 11346 for September 2015 for payment in the amount of \$122,583.21 were presented for approval (E:66:15). Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve.

President Langer opened the public hearing on the proposed 2015 budget and revenue at 8:10 a.m. to hear from people who have comments regarding the proposed budget. He announced that no debate is allowed and each speaker is given 3 minutes to speak. Speakers will go in the order of those who have signed up on the sign-in sheet to speak.

Ms. Rowena Miller, a resident of Edmonds, expressed that the she and the League of Women Voters are interested in fair taxes and would like to see more detailed board meeting minutes. The tax increase is a burden to the poor in our community. She also asked about the wind turbine and solar language in Resolution 2015:06. President Langer closed the budget hearing at 8:15 a.m.

President Langer moved the Public Comment Item I on the meeting agenda to item E before the Program Oversight committee report.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Resolution 2015:06 approving the dollar amount and percentage increase in the District's regular property tax levy for calendar year 2015.

Resolution 2015:06 Adopting 2016 Property Tax Levy

Resolution 2016:07

Commissioner Knowles noted that hospital districts are eligible for an automatic 1% levy increase each year as a way to keep up with inflation. In 2015, Snohomish County's rate

of inflation was 0.251% and this is the maximum increase that the district can receive without passing an additional "substantial need" resolution. To lessen the burden on taxpayers, the district has decided to receive only the 0.251% with banked capacity of \$18,359.38.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Resolution 2015:07 approving and adopting the District's budget for calendar year 2016.

Public Comments

Mr. Dick Van Hollebeke, 580 Hemlock Way, Edmonds, is one of three co-founders of the Creative Age Festival in Edmonds (CAFÉ) and is seeking \$9,000 in funding for an event on April 15 to 16, 2016.

Mr. Van Hollebeke said that the festival is geared toward people at or near retirement. He said that studies have shown a correlation between older adults involvement in the arts and their health and longevity.

Program Oversight Committee Update

The Program Oversight Committee met on October 22, 2015 and reviewed a total of three application requests (E:67:15): two new requests and one renewal request. No conflicts of interest were reported by any of the commissioners.

New Funding Applications:

- 1. Snohomish Health District Growing Healthy Together a reworked application from a proposal submitted in October 2014. The request is for \$173,096 per year for three years to support low-income parents with a focus on nutrition, peer support and resources. The committee is recommending having the Snohomish Health District make a presentation to Verdant's board.
- 2. Creative Age Festival Edmonds (CAFÉ) Edmonds Senior Center as fiscal sponsor. The one-time request is for \$9,000 to support an arts festival that will teach people to stay healthy and engaged in the community. The event will take place over two days in April 2016 in Edmonds and will include 30 workshops on arts, exercise, nutrition, visual arts, travel, technology, and volunteerism. The committee is not recommending funding of the program at this time as there are not enough measureable health outcomes from the event to justify a \$9,000 investment from Verdant. President Langer noted that Verdant has fully supported numerous other

> senior programs in the past. The committee is open to the Superintendent considering use of his discretionary funds to support the event if he feels it is appropriate.

Renewal Request:

1. American Diabetes – Stop Diabetes Initiative – a renewal request for an education and support program for individuals living with diabetes. The program reached 50 people but fell short in terms of biometric screening numbers (goal was 35) and diabetes risk assessments (goal was 160).

Commissioner Williams stated that on average, there is a saving of \$4,000 per year for every unit of decline in A1C. He would like to ask American Diabetes for comparisons on what is going on around the country regarding this type of program. The board decided to table this request until American Diabetes can come to a board meeting to answer their questions and address concerns.

In an effort to ensure that the full board has the opportunity to be informed about Verdant's programs, the Program Committee is recommending that every other month, a different partner organization is scheduled for a presentation and discussion at the regular board meetings starting in January 2016.

Verdant Community Wellness Center Activities Ms. Waldin presented the summary of programs held at the VCWC in October 2015 as well as a list of upcoming programs (Exhibit 68:15).

Marketing Report Ms. Piplic presented the report for October 2015 highlighting the Winter edition of The Canopy (E:70:15) which was delivered to homes in mid-October 2015 and the draft agenda (E:69:15) for the 1st annual Verdant Healthier Community Conference on February 29, 2016 at the Lynnwood Convention Center. There will be 3 tracks of break-out sessions, a morning keynote speaker, a lunch-time keynote speaker and a wrap up in the afternoon. The cost is \$49 per person with scholarship opportunities. This conference is geared for anyone who lives or works in south Snohomish County.

Commissioner Williams asked why the date of Monday, February 29th was chosen instead of a Saturday. Ms. Piplic responded that Verdant is working with our partner

organizations to promote the conference to their employees and constituents, so a weekday conference would best meet the needs of this base audience for the event. When looking into scheduling this event, availability of the convention center also had to be considered, which limited our options for days as well, she said.

Commissioner Comments

Commissioner Williams attended the Swedish Strategic meeting and informed the board that Swedish expects a 12% increase in population in Snohomish County which is above the state average and that for age 65 plus, there is a projected 30% increase in the need for medical services in the next 10 years. Many people will go to Swedish in downtown Seattle but they are still projecting a 30% to 60% increase in volume of patients over the next 10 years in Snohomish County. Some practitioners have discussed the potential for a future Geriatric Center of Excellence at the Swedish Edmonds campus.

The hospital also received a Leap Frog score of A.

Superintendent's Report

Superintendent Zapora reported on the following items:

- 1. He appreciates the board input and the program committee recommendation on the CAFÉ proposal and will consider funding from the Superintendent Discretionary Fund with a report to the board.
- 2. He has received positive feedback from partner organizations on the upcoming Verdant Healthier Community Conference on February 29, 2016.
- 3. Swedish Edmonds will hold a ribbon cutting ceremony for its new Emergency Department on November 7, 2015. The hospital lease directs Swedish Edmonds to do \$150 million in capital improvements over 10 years and this new Emergency Department is \$63 million of that amount.
- 4. The board is committed to build the district's reserves to \$40 million and the modest tax increase will help to get the district to that goal.

Executive Session

President Langer recessed the regular meeting at 8:51 a.m. into Executive Session to discuss potential litigation. President Langer stated that the board would reconvene in 30 minutes and no action would be taken in Executive Session.

Open Session

The board reconvened into Open Session at 9:15 a.m.

Adjourn

There being no further business to discuss, the meeting was adjourned at 9:20 a.m.

Monthly Highlights Sept 2015

A transfer of \$1,000,000 was made from our checking account into our investment account on September 1, 2015. Verdant received dividends payments of \$40,504 and an unrealized gain of \$62,753 on our investment portfolio in September and closed with an ending market value of \$34,693,787.

Annual program commitments total \$6,461,888 and \$5,127,164 for 2015 and 2016, respectively. \$638,112 remains available to spend in 2015, of which \$79,958 is earmarked as Superintendent Discretionary.

Additional income of \$110,128 and expenses of \$28,835 from the Kruger Clinic were incurred, netting to an additional operating income of \$81,293 in September.

RESOLUTION NO. 2015-06

A resolution of the Commission of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, Washington (the "District"), approving the dollar amount and percentage increase in the District's regular property tax levy for calendar year 2016.

WHEREAS, RCW 84.55.120 requires a taxing district, other than the state, that collects regular levies to hold a public hearing on revenue sources for the district's following year's current expense budget; and

WHEREAS, RCW 84.55.120 further requires the hearing to include consideration of possible increases in property tax revenues and requires that the hearing be held prior to the time the taxing district levies the taxes or makes the request to have the taxes levied; and

WHEREAS, RCW 84.55.120 authorizes the taxing district to hold a public hearing in conjunction with its annual budget hearing required by RCW 70.44.060(6); and

WHEREAS, a hearing in compliance with RCW 84.55.120 and RCW 70.44.060(6) was held on October 28, 2015; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the District, after hearing and duly considering all relevant evidence and testimony presented, determined that the District requires an increase in property tax revenue from the previous year, in addition to that resulting from the addition of new construction, increases in assessed value due to construction of electric generation wind turbine facilities classified as personal property, improvements to property and any increase in the value of state-assessed property, in order to discharge the expected expenses and obligations of the District; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Commission of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, Washington, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Commissioners hereby determines that the District requires a regular levy in calendar year 2016 of \$2,220,000 which amount is exclusive of the additional tax revenue resulting from the addition of new construction, increases in assessed value due to construction of electric generation wind turbine facilities classified as personal property, improvements to property and any increase in the value of state-assessed property, and amounts authorized by law as a result of any refunds made, in order to discharge the expected expenses and obligations of the District.

Section 2. The Board of Commissioners hereby approves an increase in the District's regular property tax levy for calendar year 2016 in the amount of \$23,831.33, which is a percentage increase of 1.1024% from calendar year 2015. This increase shall be in addition to the increase in tax revenue resulting from the addition of new construction, increases in assessed value due to construction of electric generation wind turbine facilities classified as personal property, improvements to property and any increase in the value of state-assessed property.

Section 3. The Superintendent is directed to certify to the County Assessor, no later than November 30, 2015, a copy of this Resolution showing its adoption; and to perform such other duties as are necessary or required by law to the end that the maximum levy capacity available to the District under chapter 84.55 RCW, as determined by the Washington State Supreme Court, is banked for use in future years.

Three application requests up for discussion:

- Two new requests
- o One renewal request

New Program Requests

• Snohomish Health District – Growing Healthy Together: a reworked application from a proposal submitted in October 2014. The request is for \$173,096 per year for three years.

The program would support low-income parents with a focus on nutrition, peer support and other resources. Funds would be used for a team including a part-time dietician, program assistant, and manager, and to pay rent at a church adjacent to the Lynnwood Foodbank. The goal of the program would be to link participants to a medical home, increase social supports, increase positive parenting and consumption of healthier meals.

The program committee is recommending having the Snohomish Health District make a presentation to Verdant's board. There was interest in addressing the social determinants of health, but committee members wanted more information about the approach and had some questions about how effective the nutrition pieces of the program would be.

• Creative Age Festival Edmonds (CAFE) – Edmonds Senior Center as Fiscal Sponsor: a one-time request for \$9,000 to support a festival that will teach people to stay healthy and engaged in the community. The event will take place over two days in April in Edmonds. The event plans 30 workshops, including on arts, exercise, nutrition, visual arts, travel, technology, and volunteerism.

The program committee is not recommending funding the program at this time. The committee felt there were not enough measurable health outcomes from the event to justify a \$9,000 investment from Verdant, especially given that the registration cost would be \$50 per person. The committee was open to the Superintendent using some of his discretionary funds to support the event if he felt it was appropriate.

Renewal Requests

• American Diabetes – Stop Diabetes Initiative: a renewal request for an education and support program for individuals living with diabetes. The program includes two series of education workshops per year, health screenings, and a walking group. The program expects to reach 50 people per year who will complete education workshops, provide 35 with biometric screenings, and 160 with a diabetes risk assessment.

The committee would like the full board to weigh in on a funding decision. The program fits with Verdant's priorities and has provided some direct education and support, but the committee members had

questions about the program's effectiveness and cost per participant. The cost per participant is \$1,000 per person. The average A1C improved from 7.4% to 6.4% for participants screened from 2014 to 2015.

Program Budget: \$50,000 per year to support at 0.5 FTE staff member and other direct program costs.

Discussion about Program Presentations to the Board

The program committee had a discussion about how to ensure that the full board has the opportunity to be informed about Verdant's funded programs. The committee is recommending that every other month we schedule a different partner organization for a presentation and discussion.

The focus of the presentations would be to review their results and discuss their long-term sustainability plans. The committee brainstormed a list of possible programs, which would initially focus on organizations that have received larger grants from Verdant. We would start the presentations during our January regular board meeting.
