Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, was called

to order at 8:03 a.m. by President Langer.

Approval of Minutes

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the minutes of the regular meeting on

October 26, 2016.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the minutes of the special board meeting on

November 9, 2016.

Executive Committee

President Langer reported that the Executive Committee met on November 7, 2016 and the committee's primary focus has been the selection of a new superintendent for the district. A motion will be introduced at this meeting to appoint a superintendent and remove Carl Zapora as superintendent of the district and action will be taken at the

December 2016 regular board meeting.

Executive Session

President Langer adjourned the regular meeting at 8:05 a.m. into Executive Session to evaluate qualifications of applicants for the Superintendent position. No action will be taken and the session should last 15 minutes at which time the board would reconvene into open session.

Open Session

The board reconvened into Open Session at 8:15 a.m.

Superintendent Appointment Resolution 2016:09 appointing Dr. Robin Fenn as superintendent of the district and removing Carl Zapora as Superintendent of the district was introduced. Dr. Fenn's most recent employment has been with the Snohomish County Department of Human Services as their research manager.

Board Finance Committee The committee met on November 9, 2016. Ms. King reviewed the financial statements and cash activity for October 2016 (E:71:16). Warrants called out include #11885 to Waldron for \$19,883.20, #11891 to Matt Sacks Speaks for Kevin Breel keynote speaker at the February 27, 2017 Verdant Healthier Community Conference, and #11902 for \$10,186.67 to Consolidated Press for the printing of the Fall 2016 edition of The Canopy newsletter.

Authorization for Payment of Vouchers & Payroll Warrant Numbers 11877 through 11928 for October 2016 for payment in the amount of \$121,372.84 were presented for approval (E:7**2**:16). *Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve.*

Report &
Recommendations

No conflicts of interest were reported by any of the commissioners present.

The Program Committee met on November 10, 2016 to review three applications for funding, follow-up on Mercy Housing & Center for Human Services request, and follow-up on the Building Healthy Communities Fund proposals (E:73:16).

The Edmonds Senior Center provided a letter to the commissioners to aid in their decision making (E:74:16).

The committee recommended tabling all Building Healthy Communities Fund applications for 6 months (to June 2017) as commissioners have concerns about access to healthcare due to the recent presidential election and perhaps funds will be more needed for access.

Commissioners Langer, Knowles & Knutsen each shared their agreement about tabling the proposals.

Program Applications Recommended for Funding: Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the Puget Sound Kidney Centers (PSKC) Chronic Kidney Disease Education & Prevention Program for two more years, at \$48,000 in the first year and \$40,000 in the second year, with the expectation that PSKC be prepared to sustain the program after the second year of renewed funding.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the Community Health Center of Snohomish County (CHC) Dental Program request at \$200,000 per year for two years.

Commissioner Knutsen moved that the Snohomish County Music Project Music Therapy for Vulnerable Populations at \$29,000 per year for two more years be approved but there was no second and the motion died. Discussion among the commissioners resulted in mixed reviews of the program. Mr. Kosovich will provide program outcomes and research support at the upcoming board retreat on December 2-3, 2016.

Follow-Up on Previously Discussed Proposals:

Center for Human Services – Edmonds Family Medicine PCP and Behavioral Health Integration request to support two mental health clinicians from the Center for Human Services at Edmonds Family Medicine. The Program Committee would like to invite the applicant in for a presentation at the December 2016 regular board meeting.

Mercy Housing – Health in Housing Program request for \$180,000 per year for three years to implement health programs at 7 affordable housing complexes. The Program Committee is recommending waiting for more information and proven outcomes from King County ACH and Housing Authority projects.

Presentation from Sandra Huber, Community Wellness Ms. Huber provided the commissioners with an update on the Spanish-language programming that has occurred over the past 6 months. This programming includes CPR training, National Night Out in Lynnwood, Meet Me at the Park in Lynnwood, food label education, immigration & health, preparing healthy meals, teen suicide prevention, dementia

Outreach Specialist

in the Latino community, and 40 hours of bilingual and bicultural training to 19 community health workers. Community dialogues have also been held with the Latino community, with results aligning with Verdant's priorities.

Verdant Community Wellness Center Update

See (E:7,5:16) for this month's report. Commissioner Knutsen complimented both Ms. Huber & Ms. Waldin for the extensive breadth of programming that has occurred in the wellness center.

Marketing Report

Ms. Piplic reported on the Verdant Healthier Community Conference which will be held on Monday, February 27, 2017 at the Lynnwood Convention Center. The topical agenda and break-out sessions and sponsorship opportunities are currently being worked on and a report will be given at the December 2016 regular board meeting.

Superintendent's Report

Superintendent Zapora reported on six items:

- 1. If any commissioners know of potential sponsors for the Verdant Healthier Community Conference, please inform him or Ms. Piplic. There are three levels of sponsorship: \$5000, \$2500, and \$1000.
- 2. Commended Ms. Waldin & Ms. Huber for the variety of programs at the wellness center.
- 3. Reminder that the board retreat starts at 12 p.m. on Friday, December 2, 2016 and ends at 12 p.m. on Saturday, December 3, 2016 at the Hilton Garden Inn in Mukilteo. Ms. Margot Helphand will be this year's facilitator.
- 4. Reminder that the next regular board meeting is December 14, 2016 to act on Resolution 2016:09.
- 5. Dr. Robin Fenn will be a great superintendent for the district and the leadership transition from one superintendent to the next will go well.
- 6. Evite was send for December 8, 2016 retirement party.

Public Comments

Mr. Farrell Fleming of the Edmonds Senior Center understands the course of action the board is taking with regards to the Building Healthy Communities Fund applications and that despite any uncertainty in the political arena, good work still needs to continue. He encouraged the board to keep a modest amount of money aside for capital projects as these projects will last for many years.

Mr. Phil Smith of Volunteers of America echoed Mr. Fleming's comments and encouraged the board that we must not lose sight of serving the most vulnerable populations during these uncertain times and should leverage all resources.

Commissioner Comments

Commissioner Williams commented that Verdant should take the lead on holding a discussion on a state level response to the possible repeal of the ACA with Molina, Providence, and others from Olympia.

Commissioner Knutsen commented that she has been working for the past 25 years on health care access and is hopeful about the future. She thinks that many people in Washington want a single-payer system.

President Langer assured both VOA and the Edmonds Senior Center that their funding requests will be given attention in the coming months.

There being no further business to discuss, the meeting was adjourned at 9:16 a.m.

Annual program commitments total \$6,493,746 and \$5,223,463 for 2016 and 2017, respectively. \$1,206,254 remains available to spend in 2016, of which \$34,587 is earmarked as Superintendent Discretionary.

Additional income of \$115,561 and expenses of \$67,355 from the Kruger Clinic were incurred, netting to an additional operating income of \$48,206 in October.

- 1. Building Healthy Community Fund Proposal Follow-Up
- 2. Three program funding requests for review and discussion
- 3. Follow-up on Mercy Housing and Center for Human Services/EFM request

Building Healthy Communities Fund Proposals

Summary of Discussion at October Regular Board Meeting

- Some interest in directing funds to programs/services and away from bricks and mortar;
- For Sea Mar project, interest in directing funds to health promotion and healthcare access vs. a general grant for clinic space;
- Several commissioners agreed the health programs on the VOA project could use additional description.

1.) Sea Mar Clinic (\$1 million request)

- Conducted a conference call with Sea Mar and CHC of Snohomish County to clarify relationship and willingness to cooperate in Lynnwood. CHC expressed some concerns, but discussion was positive.
- Sea Mar is moving their behavioral health providers to the new building because their lease is up on their current Lynnwood space. The medical/dental build out would follow at a future date.

2.) Edmonds Senior Center/Waterfront Center (\$1.75 million request)

Edmonds Senior Center provided a follow up letter responding to questions raised in October board meeting:

- Made the case that building project supports programs and would double program participation from 4,000 to 8,000 by year 3 and to 10,000 annually by year five. Programs include Fitness, Healthy Living Workshops/Resources, Direct Health Services, and Counseling and Support.
- Expand hours where the City will be offering programs from 4:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.; added square feet for programming and the interest that will come from the new multi-generational facility.
- Expansion will not require expanded Verdant program funding, in contrast to other Verdant-funded senior programs.

Room to Grow Verdant Initiatives – as a program partner, ESC would hope Verdant would think of organization as an extension of assets available for future expansion of Verdant initiatives and programs.

Critical Timing – \$4M toward \$11M goal (\$2M from Rick Steves, \$1.25M from WA State, \$500K from the City and the rest from the Board and foundations). The 50% raised milestone is significant for a number of funders, with \$500K in grants pending with both Hazel Miller and the C. Keith Birkenfeld Charitable Trust. Both want to see "significant" funds raised and will make their decisions in December. The \$4M raised does not include a \$1M challenge from Rick Steves. He will commit the million when they have raised a matching million. A \$2.25M capital request is pending with the State to be considered in the 2017 legislative session. It is a competitive process with dollars raised being a major consideration. ESC notes that a commitment from Verdant now would be both a stamp of approval and more importantly would set a great deal of additional funding in motion.

3.) Trinity/Volunteers of America Project (\$1.5 million request):

Provided Letters of Support from: Reps. Kagi & Ryu, County Executive Somers, County Councilperson Somers, Dale Turner YMCA, Center for Human Services, and Lutheran Community Services Northwest.

Timing on Funding: VOA notes that getting a commitment from Verdant is critical to making its case to private and public funders. Construction is targeted for 2019-2020.

Verdant design: VOA would be excited to have Verdant participate in planning and design of facility, including outlining services.

Verdant Program Committee Recommendation: the committee members were not ready to commit funding to any of these projects at this time. They had concerns about the uncertainty of healthcare access at the national level, and the committee members would prefer to defer any decision and re-evaluate in June of 2017.

Program Applications Recommended for Funding

Puget Sound Kidney Centers (PSKC) Chronic Kidney Disease Education & Prevention Program: a renewal
request for a Chronic Kidney Disease Education & Prevention Program. The program focuses on supporting
chronic kidney disease patients at stage 3 or 4 and other pre-dialysis patients interested in learning about
their disease.

The committee reviewed additional information about the program services and PSKC funding of the program. After reviewing this information, the committee is recommending funding the program for two more years, at \$48,000 in the first year and \$40,000 in the second year, with the expectation that PSKC be prepared to sustain the program after the second year of renewed funding.

2. Snohomish County Music Project - Music Therapy for Vulnerable Populations: a renewal request for a program that provides music therapy services in the community. The initial goal was to serve middle-aged men dealing with depression and PTSD, but the program struggled to attract South Snohomish County participants, so Verdant approved a switch to focus on youth through the Boys & Girls Club.

Since October, 2016 the program has been serving veterans at Catholic Community Service's new Lynnwood veteran's housing Complex. The applicant is requesting an increase in funding to serve youth, veterans, and individuals at YWCA housing. The program committee is recommending renewing funding the program for two more years at \$29,000 per year with a focus on serving veterans through the program.

3. Community Health Center of Snohomish County (CHC) – Dental Program: a renewal request for a dental program for uninsured adults. Verdant previously funded the project for two one-year increments. Under the renewed program, dental patients would be identified as follows: 50 patients (300 visits) in need of restorative care from Senior Services, 50 patients identified by CHC (300 visits) who will commit to an ongoing treatment plan, and an additional 150 uninsured patients in need of emergency care (300 visits) will be served at the Lynnwood CHC Walk-In clinic

Unlike previous grant request, no care coordinator costs would be charged to program. Verdant would reimburse CHC for low-income uninsured treatment costs at the FQHC Medicaid rate. The program committee is recommending fully funding the request at \$200,000 per year for two years.

Follow-Up on Previously Discussed Proposals


4. Center for Human Services - Edmonds Family Medicine: PCP and Behavioral Health Integration: a request to support two mental health clinicians from the Center for Human Services at Edmonds Family Medicine. The program is designed to integrate behavioral health and primary health care at a medical clinic. EFM patients would be screened for probability of behavioral health issues, and, when appropriate, provided with a "warm hand-off" to a behavioral health clinician. After referral, the patient will be screened more thoroughly and, if appropriate, participate in brief interventions (averaging 6 sessions). Center for Human Services is requesting \$190,999 per year for three years for the program.

The program committee reviewed written responses to questions about the program—the committee would like to invite the applicant in for a presentation in Verdant's December board meeting. The committee felt like they did not fully understand the program model, but members were interested in exploring integrating behavioral health services in a primary care setting.

5. Mercy Housing – Health in Housing Program: a request for \$180,000 per year for three years that would implement health programs at 7 affordable housing complexes. The program is modeled after a project Mercy has operated in partnership with the King County Housing Authority using Community Health Promoters, with the goal to address health disparities and social determinants of health. Most of the funding (\$140,000) would be dedicated to staffing costs, including 2.5 FTE Community Health Promoters/Coordinators. The programs expects to serve 800 residents per year

At Verdant board member's request, we convened a meeting of stakeholders to discuss the program, including from Mercy Housing, YWCA, Molina HealthCare, NorthSound ACH, Washington State HCA, and Verdant. The meeting helped clarify the possible connections to the ACH, HCA transformation and Managed Care organizations like Molina.

The program committee is recommending waiting for more information and proven outcomes from King County ACH and Housing Authority projects. Although the model of health promotion was interesting, committee members were looking for concrete outcome data before committing the level of funding requested (\$540,000 in total).

Dear Commissioners:

We want to share four points we believe are relevant to your decision concerning our application:

Program Services - First and foremost is the remarkable health/wellness program impact we anticipate in the new Edmonds Waterfront Center. From strictly an unduplicated annual participation level we will double our current 4,000 people to 8,000 by our third year of operation. This will increase to 10,000 annually by year five. This growth is made possible by the expanded hours where the City will be offering programs in the building from 4:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.; added square feet for programming and the interest that will come from the new multi-generational facility.

There will also be significant program expansion with our health and wellness partners like Bastyr University. The new building offers four times the number of exam rooms. We anticipate our meals program will double by year three serving 20,000 healthy meals annually. Finally, we will be offering new programs tied to positive health outcomes like the intergenerational drama program we did with the Edmonds Woodway high school drama students this past spring. When you consider the collective impact of these services over a 10-year period you get a sense of the transformative potential of this project.

Investing in Community Infrastructure – In terms of leveraging program impact there is no better investment than capital infrastructure. Rather than annual program grants, a one-time capital investment yields 40 to 50 years of annual community impact. Nearly all health and wellness programs take "place" in buildings. No places, no programs. Verdant's commitment to investing in both program and community infrastructure is wise as it allows Verdant to promote innovation in program delivery while creating the needed infrastructure to support those programs for decades.

Room to Grow Verdant Initiatives – Community needs and demographics are constantly changing. We have designed the space to maximize flexibility so we can respond to changing needs and opportunities to reach more people. We will have capacity for expanding services in the new Center. As a program partner, we would hope Verdant would think of us as an extension of your assets available for future expansion of Verdant initiatives and programs.

Further Leverage of Timing – Raising money is never easy. The timing of certain commitments during a campaign can have an exponential impact on other gifts serving as a tipping point for fundraising. That is the case for the grant request you are considering for this project. We have raised \$4M toward our \$11M goal (\$2M from Rick Steves, \$1.25M from the State, \$500K from the City and the rest from the Board and foundations). The 50% raised milestone is significant for a number of funders. We currently have \$500K grants pending with both the Hazel Miller Foundation and the C. Keith Birkenfeld Charitable Trust. Both want to see "significant" funds raised and will making their decisions in December.

The \$4M raised does not include a \$1M community challenge from Rick Steves. He will commit the million when we have raised a matching million from other individuals. We will be launching that community challenge in early December. We have a \$2.25M capital request pending with the State to be considered in the 2017 legislative session. It is a competitive process with dollars raised being a major consideration. All this is to say, a commitment from Verdant *now* would be both a stamp of approval and more importantly would set a great deal of additional funding in motion.
