- Superintendent goals were sent to commissioners. Dr. Fenn is awaiting feedback or questions from commissioners.
- 4. Dr. Fenn met twice with Congressman Rick Larsen and members of his team.
- 5. Ms. Piplic is initiating conversations with local media Re: future coverage of programs and columns contributed by Verdant.
- 6. Ms. King arranged Bond 101 training with Piper Jaffrey on August 8, 2017. Dr. Williams attended. Dr. Williams provided a brief summary to the other commissioners of options available should the District consider issuing bonds for a future project.

Point of Order was called by Commissioner Langer asking that staff contact legal counsel to confirm that quorum was not in attendance by the inclusion of commissioners participating in the meeting telephonically. Staff and commissioners agreed that no business would be conducted, as three commissioners were not present in-person. Commissioner Langer asked that we look into possible bylaw amendments allowing for quorum to be present if commissioners join the meeting telephonically.

Finance Committee Report

The committee met on August 17, 2017. Ms. King reviewed the financial statements and cash activity for July 2017 (E:57:17). No action was taken.

Value Village Discussion

Patrick Doherty presented the Edmonds Highway 99 Subarea Plan (E:60:17), which was approved by Edmonds City Council recently. He said the development of this plan took a year and a half and included many stakeholders. The intent is to change the corridor into a full-service community, where people can live, shop, and work, and he outlined the different areas of the plan, including the Health Care District that includes the hospital.

Commissioner Knowles asked if there are details regarding the city's goal for the health care corridor.

Mr. Doherty shared that the city's vision for mixed use development along Highway 99 applied to the Health Care District as well as the other areas. The city would like to see both residential and retail in the Health Care District as well as other direct healthcare services.

Dr. Fenn asked about the level of interest among developers at this time, related to both housing and healthcare. Mr. Doherty said that there have been three developers who have expressed interest in housing and no direct requests or preapplications related to medical services, but there has been some interest. He encouraged staff and commissioners to stay engaged in this work and consider attending an October open house to learn more, although the specific date and time for the open house is TBD.

Ms. Waldin presented an update on activities in the center for July 2017 (E:61:17).

Program Funding Requests

Applications Recommended for Funding

1. Edmonds Senior Center—Enhancing Health & Wellness Programs: a renewal request for health programs at the Edmonds Senior Center. The renewal program request would continue the major programs and services and add some new program extensions. The programs to be continued include the Enhance Wellness Program in partnership with Sound Generations, PEARLS (for depression) in partnership with the University of Washington Health Promotion Research Center, Living Well with Chronic Conditions (Diabetes/Pain), Palliative/End of Life Care, Support Groups, Brain Health and Cognitive Training classes.

The core programs (PEARLs, Enhance Wellness, Chronic Disease Management) are evidence-based programs and are on track to meet their performance goals for the 3-year period. The senior center requested an average of \$127,000 per year and the program is currently funded at \$110,000 per year.

The program committee is recommending partially funding the request at an average of \$116,000 per year for the next three years.

- 2. Cities of Lynnwood, Edmonds, and Mountlake Terrace Swim Lesson Program: a renewal request for a swim lesson program with three city-operated pools (Mountlake Terrace, Edmonds/Yost, and the City of Lynnwood Recreation Center). The current program provided 3 sets of swim lessons (10 ea.) to every third-grade student in the Edmonds School District. The program also includes in-classroom safety instruction from pool staff. The three cities are proposing a reworked model to target larger numbers on non-swimmers by:
 - Limiting the 3rd grade vouchers to basic swim instruction (would exclude more competitive lessons) and continuing the classroom education at 3rd grade.
 - Launching a new program to attract non-swimmers of all ages and provide any non-swimmer youth with swim lesson vouchers. The pools would offer quarterly water safety education/evaluation events where non-swimmers would be identified and provided with swimming vouchers.

Similar to the previous program model, Verdant would fund lessons only when vouchers are redeemed at a cost of \$8 per lesson, with a maximum of 30 lessons per child. The program committee is recommending funding the revised program—the committee felt that the program redesign would better target youth with low swimming abilities.

Funding Applications Not Recommended for Funding:

3. Farmer Frog – Meadowdale Pocket Farm: a request for \$25,000 in funding to build a small "pocket" farm in Meadowdale Park. The space would be leased from the City of Lynnwood and would be used for school field trips, growing and harvesting produce for backpack programs, how-to-classes on growing and harvesting produce, etc. Verdant asked the organization to provide more detailed outcome data, and Farmer Frog provided very large estimated program outputs (ex. 25,000 adults educated and 15,000 families provided with food).


The program committee is not recommending funding at this time. Although the farm/community garden will provide a nice amenity the community, it is not clear that Farmer Frog has the capacity to track and measure health and education outcomes from programming.

4. Beecher's Pure Food Kids Foundation/Sound Food Uprising: a multi-year request averaging \$100,000 per year over three years to provide nutrition education to adults in South Snohomish County. The program is built around a two-session workshop focused on food, nutrition, and consumer power that encourages people to make better informed decisions about buying and consuming food. Using a mobile cart, the program can be delivered at flexible locations and teaches skills like food selection, knife skills, and batch cooking. The applicant estimates that 850 individuals would be trained in year 1, growing to 1,420 by year 3.

The program committee is not recommending the program for funding. Although the curriculum has been vetted through Swedish clinical faculty, it is still in "beta" phase and largely unproven in generating health outcomes.

5. ChildStrive – Building a Resilient South Snohomish County: a multi-request of \$325,000 per year for a comprehensive program to support building resilient families. The long-term goals of the program are to increase parenting skills, positive child development, and increased family resiliency. Grant funds would be used to support early intervention and Parents as Teachers Program, add community engagement staff, and add a restorative practices and mindfulness specialists.

The program committee is not recommending the program for funding. Although the committee supports the long-term goals of the program, they did not see enough evidence that the focus on restorative practices and mindfulness would directly lead to improved measures of family resiliency, positive child development, or a decrease in child abuse.

PLANNED ACTION

A Planned Action EIS is an upfront assessment of environmental conditions, potential impacts, and mitigation measures for the Edmonds Highway 99 Subarea, rather than a piecemeal analysis on a project-by project basis. As such, the EIS provides developers certainty and predictability while streamlining the environmental review and permitting process and furthering the goals of the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) and the Growth Management Act (GMA). Planned actions still need to meet the City's development regulations and to obtain necessary permits.

SUBAREA PLAN

This Plan provides guidance for how the corridor should grow and change in the future and sets forth the opportunities and actions needed to address the challenges on Highway 99. The Plan identifies the constraints and opportunities for land use, transportation, and economic development. It describes two alternative scenarios representing different intensities of investment and redevelopment in the short- and long-term future.




