Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, was called to order at 8:01 a.m. by President Knutsen.

Approval of Minutes

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the minutes of the regular board meeting on August 22, 2018.

Executive Committee

Report

The committee met on September 19, 2018 to review the agenda for the September 26, 2018 board meeting and other upcoming events.

No action was taken.

Superintendent Report Superintendent Fenn reported on the following items:

 In the interest of time, the Verdant Community Wellness Center summary, Multicultural program update and Marketing report are included in the board packet for review but will not be discussed today.
 See the October 2018 calendar of upcoming events (E:73:18) that commissioners may be interested in attending.

2. Dr. Fenn is looking forward to the Building Healthy Communities Fund presentations today and the board's decisions on the funding.

Finance Committee Report

The committee met on September 11, 2018. Ms. King reviewed the financial statements and cash activity for August 2018 (E:74:18). She called out the \$1.1 million received on August 22, 2018 from the Washington State Health Care Authority for the final CPE settlement from SFY 2010 to SFY 2011.

Authorization for Payment of Vouchers & Payroll

Warrant Numbers 13043 through 13117 for August 2018 for payment in the amount of \$248,231.79 were presented for approval (E:75:18). *Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve.*

Program Committee Update

The Program Committee met on September 19, 2018 to review three new regular program applications and two renewal requests (E:76:18).

Commissioner Knowles asked if there were any conflicts of interest and none were reported by the commissioners present.

Mr. Kosovich presented the requests and Commissioner Knowles presented the committee recommendations to the board.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Community Health Center of Snohomish County's School Sealant Program in the amount of \$30,000 on a one-time basis.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Wonderland Developmental Center's Clinic for Prenatal Substance Exposure in the amount of \$196,757 for Year 1, \$176,872 for Year 2, and \$132,163 for Year 3. Commissioner Langer asked if the funds would be disbursed in 2018. Mr. Kosovich replied that these funds would likely flow in 2019. Superintendent Fenn mentioned that this program addresses the need for services for children exposed to parental substance use and she has heard that there is a need for these services countywide.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Domestic Violence Services of Spohomish County's

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Domestic Violence Services of Snohomish County's renewal request in the amount of \$22,266 per year for three years for the teen dating violence prevention program.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the Boys and Girls Clubs of Snohomish County Healthy Habits Program in the partial funding amount of

> \$295,000 per year for three years contingent on the afterschool activity and nutrition program serving 200 more participants per year.

Commissioners Langer and Wilson asked for an overview on their fitness measurements.

Not Recommended for Funding at this time:

Domestic Violence Services of Snohomish County's Community Health Advocate. Commissioners requested additional information before a final decision is made. Commissioner Langer also had questions around this program's connection to Verdant's mission. Commissioner Knowles shared that he saw the connection and that the Program Committee would follow-up on the project.

Building Healthy Communities Fund Q & A Each of the five applicants provided written answers to the board's questions on their proposals (E:77:18). All applicants were present to verbally respond to board questions:

- 1. City of Edmonds Outdoor Fitness Zones (E:78:18) Carrie Hite via telephone
- 2. City of Mountlake Terrace Evergreen Playfields (E:79:18) Ken Courtmanch and Adam Bettcher in person
- 3. SeaMar Lynnwood Clinic (E:80:18) Carolina Lucero, Claudia D'Allegri, and Tabitha Gross in person

President Knutsen adjourned the meeting at 9:05 a.m. to allow time for MTI and CHC guests to arrive. President Knutsen reconvened the meeting at 9:15 a.m.

Mr. Kosovich reminded the board that they can approve funding as is, approve partial funding, or assign contingencies to any of these five proposals.

Commissioner Wilson informed the board via text that her flight was departing and her stated preferences are for both the MTI and CHC proposals to be funded.

After discussion, the board made the following decisions:

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the City of Edmonds Outdoor Fitness Zones in the amount of \$170,000 over three years.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the City of Mountlake Terrace Evergreen Playfields in the amount of \$1,000,000.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve SeaMar Lynnwood Clinic in the amount of \$1 million contingent on other funding sources identified within 6 months. Mr. Kosovich clarified with the board that the source of the funding (federal state, organizational reserves) is not crucial to their decision.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Medical Teams International Mobile Dental Vehicle in the amount of \$358,917.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve CHC of Snohomish County Integrated Pain Management & Recovery Services clinic in the amount of \$2,500,000 over two years.

Commissioner Langer commented to the five organizations that there were several other groups that did not receive further consideration and he wished these five organizations the best in their projects.

President Knutsen thanked the five organizations for their submissions and commented that she looks forward to seeing their projects up and running.

Program Committee Recommendations (Commissioners Knowles & Knutsen)

Recommended for Funding:

- Community Health Center of Snohomish County School Sealant Program: recommended for full funding at \$30,000 on a one-time basis. The committee felt that the program connected to a Verdant priority (dental care) and also addressed the issue with a prevention focus. The committee would like CHC to report back on the referrals of students for follow-up dental care.
- Wonderland Development Center Clinic for Prenatal Substance Exposure: recommended for funding as
 requested over three years. The committee members felt that the program addressed a key community
 issue (substance use exposure for children) and provided an important new service in South Snohomish
 County. As usual, the committee members would like to see that program goals are met each year for
 continued funding.
- Domestic Violence Services Prevention & Education Program: recommended for funding as requested over three years. The committee felt the program addressed a community need and has shown good results to date.
- Boys and Girls Clubs of Snohomish County Healthy Habits Program: recommended for partial funding at \$295,000 per year for three years. When renewed for two years in 2016, Verdant increased funding and asked the applicant to seek out other funding sources. Verdant is still the primary funder on the program, with the applicant making progress on attracting some small grant funding. The committee members would like the funding to be contingent on serving 200 more participants per year.

- Domestic Violence Services of Snohomish County Community Health Advocate: the committee members were interested in the proposal but requested some additional information. Question included:

ANSWERS

1. The timing of the request is to allow for the installment of the first fitness zone at Mathay Ballinger Park in late 2018, early 2019, and the second fitness zone as part of the downtown Civic Field development in 2020.

Mathay Ballinger Park installation will be dependent upon the release of funds and the weather window in order to construct. Because we are getting to be a bit late in the year, it is likely that we will install this in 2019 in preparation for the spring/summer season. We will provide orientations and drop in programming at Mathay during 2019 to jump start the use of the fitness zone.

Civic Field in downtown Edmonds is a new acquisition for the City. The City has master planned this park with the community and is currently working on design. One of the key features of the new development in this park is an outdoor fitness zone. It is best to time the installation of the fitness zone with the development of the whole park, which is planned for 2020.

The budget submitted reflects the Mathay Ballinger fitness zone to be installed in 2018 (possibly 2019, depending on the weather) and Civic Field in 2020. In addition, there are some funds budgeted for orientations and drop in fitness classes at both fitness zones.

2. If funds were available in a shorter time frame, this would not allow us to accelerate the schedule. The fitness zone at Civic Field is part of the larger development project and will need to be installed at that time, in 2020.

City of Mountlake Terrace Evergreen Playfield #1 Turf Conversion

1. Can you explain where the project stands in terms of permits, environmental and other regulatory review? What milestones or reviews need to be cleared before the facility is completed?

The project is ready to move forward as soon as funding is secured. Recreation staff have worked with the various departments in the city to scope all the applicable permits including: clearing and grading, SEPA, and building permit which covers electrical, plumbing, and demolition. All of these permits are solely within the jurisdiction of the City of Mountlake Terrace.

Before construction can begin the city will need to complete the design process. Once the design process has been completed the city will move forward with final design, soil analysis, cultural resources review, surveying and finally construction. The city has a goal of project completion by fall 2020 which means as soon as funding is secured, this process will begin.

2. How have nearby residents responded to the proposal, in particular to the ideas of increased usage, lighting, traffic, etc.? How has the city addressed any neighborhood concerns?

The site for this project is an existing playfield. Neighbors have enjoyed having a sports complex near them as many have kids that utilize the sports fields. Families also enjoy the complex because they frequently like to walk the lit pathways surrounding the fields.

The current lighting utilizes 1000 watt metal halides and illuminates the entire neighborhood due to the light spillage from aging technology. The new lighting systems utilize LED technology that maximizes the lighting for the sports field, but greatly reduces spillage outside the area. The city has worked with the neighbors for years to limit the hours of play on the field late at night.

The traffic impact of this project will be minimal. Participants access the field by driving the main arterials through Mountlake Terrace such as 220th St. SW and 236th St. SW. Both of these streets lead you to 56th Ave. West (which is the major north-south arterial in Mountlake Terrace or future "Main Street"). The city will also add new parking on the east side of 56th Ave away from houses adjacent to the field which will limit parking impacts on the neighbors. There is also an existing parking lot just south of the playfield that has over 100 stalls.

The city will continue to work with neighbors to incorporate any concerns into the design process. Previous concerns voiced by neighbors over the years has been related to dust being kicked up from the current dirt field in the warmer months. Due to this concern the city has to frequently water the dirt field. With a turf surface this concern would be alleviated.

The Recreation, Parks and Open Space Master Plan (RPOS) has identified this project as a top priority as far back as 1993. Each update of the plan every six years has included the project. Typically each master planning effort involves numerous stakeholder meetings, large and small public meetings with charrettes, Board and Commission input as well as City Council Review. In the last RPOS, the master plan recommendation includes "Upgrade competitive sport fields to the highest standard to maximize use" and the City's Capital Improvement Program prioritization has listed Evergreen Playfield #1 as its top park priority.

Many neighbors and citizens have expressed interest in this project as it will provide an attractive asset for the city as you drive into the town center. The field improvements will increase aesthetics and property values in the surrounding neighborhoods.

Building Healthily Communities Fund Follow-Up Questions

1. Your proposal notes that community health centers are only serving 50% of the low-income population and 42% of the Medicaid population in the area. Some of these individuals are likely seen by other (non-CHC) providers—do you have any other data showing how many people are going without care because provider capacity is not available?

According to the most recent UDS Mapper data for the Lynnwood area, there are 48,574 low income individuals. Of these individuals, 27,420 are served by community health centers such as Sea Mar Community Health Centers and Community Health Center of Snohomish County. Snohomish County has relatively low poverty rates, and Sea Mar targets pockets of poverty within the community for patients and clients who tend to fall under the radar and go quietly unserved. Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) are designed by HRSA to indicate areas that have shortages to medical, dental and behavioral health services. In the Lynnwood area, the average HPSA score of the area is 14 out of 25. The HPSA score is calculated by looking at the total population to physician ratio. The higher the HPSA score, the fewer providers in the area providing primary care services, and the greater the need for access to those services. The 2016 Snohomish County Community Health Assessment shows provider to patient ratios below shortage definitions, with a primary medical providers to people ratio of 1,904:1, mental health providers to people ratio of 453:1, and dental providers to people ratio of 1,577:1. According to the most recent 2010 Washington State Department of Health Primary Care Provider Survey of physicians in the area, 46% of providers are not accepting new Medicaid patients, which makes it difficult for this population to access the services they need. These ratios do not take into account specific geographic areas or population groups like low income, uninsured, or Medicaid and Medicare eligible individuals, for whom access barriers are increased. The Community Needs Assessment for Snohomish County outlined that one in six adults did not see a doctor in 2013 because of the cost. Other than community health centers, providers in the area will often not see uninsured patients unless they make payments up front. Community health centers provide sliding fee scale options to help reduce the access barrier associated with healthcare fees. Sea Mar is serving a vulnerable population in Lynnwood who is unable to access services provided by other providers in the area due to these barriers.

2. In 2016, the requested Verdant contribution to the clinic was \$1m, and now you are requesting \$2m. Could you explain the increased request and where this fits with other possible funding sources, including from Sea Mar's reserves or government grants?

In 2016, Sea Mar had not yet purchased the new Lynnwood site and requested funds of \$1 million to assist with the purchase of the building. Sea Mar proceeded with the purchase of the building without funding received from Verdant Health Commission. For this current proposal, Sea Mar is requesting funding to assist with the renovation costs for the purchased building. Sea Mar invested its own cash reserves along with financing to purchase the Lynnwood building, and total renovation costs are estimated to be \$2,782,690. The \$2 million requested from Verdant Health Commission will allow Sea Mar to renovate the building to adapt the current layout to an improved clinic flow that will best serve

patients with integrated medical, dental, behavioral health services, MSS and care management services, with the ultimate goal to increase access to these services for those who currently have little to no access to affordable healthcare. Sea Mar expects to cover the additional \$782,690 for renovation costs from cash reserves. Currently, the Sea Mar is offering behavioral health services at the site, and the renovation will allow for the expansion for medical, dental, Maternity Support Services (MSS), Care Management for high risk patients all under the same roof. The renovation will allow for further integration of services to provide vital, whole-person care for the most vulnerable members of the community.

1. How many additional residents served, or South County clinics can you expect to serve with this new vehicle compared to the current one?

The new Multisite Delivery Vehicle (MDV) will contain three dental operatories versus the current Mobile Dental vehicle which contains two. If funding for a new Multisite Delivery Vehicle is awarded, our current plan for this pilot project is to research existing site partners to determine where using the MDV would increase patient count and improve patient experience. We have identified three prospects and listed them in red below. The RV Mobile Dental vehicle will continue to serve patients at the other clinics. In addition, we will research and add additional site partners in South Snohomish County who will benefit from the MDV model. Also, the flexibility of the new MDV will allow for clinics to continue when one of our RV Mobile Dental vans is out for maintenance.

Below is a list of the current South Snohomish clinics and a list of prospective new clinics we will pursue. An estimated 9 – 12 months is needed to bring the new vehicle online and the pilot program and new site partners will be vetted during that time. Conversations have already begun with Homage Senior Services about hosting dental clinics with the new MDV. Current patient average for Verdant funded clinics is 7.3 patients. We project seeing an average of 11 patients at a clinic with the new MDV. With the variability of this new model and the appropriate dental staffing, the patient count has the potential to increase.





The RV Mobile Dental vehicle which Verdant partially funded will continue to be used at a majority of the mobile dental clinics in the Verdant district. The new MDV will enable us to hold additional clinics in South Snohomish County and fill in for RV Mobile Dental vans when they are out of service.

CHC of Snohomish County Proposal for Pain Clinic and Substance Abuse Complex





1. What data, research or other information can you share about the effectiveness and measurable outcomes for the pain management program? The Swedish Functional Restoration program(s) combine group and individual outpatient-based physical and occupational therapy, pain psychology, relaxation training, and nursing pain education delivered in a structured interdisciplinary team model. Studies on interdisciplinary care have demonstrated improvements in psychosocial functioning, reduced pain, and healthcare utilization₁. Prior to starting a treatment program, patients are evaluated by a pain medicine specialist and pain psychologist. A treatment plan is established and reviewed with the patient. Opioid detoxification and/or medication management may be initiated as patients prepare to start a structured program. In the most comprehensive program, the Structured Functional Restoration Program, patients participate in three, $\frac{1}{2}$ day per week, 4 week in duration programs, with sessions lasting 4-5 hrs. Patients are usually in groups of 4 patients. The SFRP also includes close monitoring by a board certified pain management specialist with weekly follow up visits providing closer adjustment to pain medications, targeting adjusting sleep, and maximizing mood. The physician also helps to coordinate and facilitate patient's progress in the program. The structured environment is an ideal setting to detoxify opioids and benzodiazepines and improve a patient's medication regime.

A team conference is held weekly where all of the team members meet to discuss each individual patient, review progress, adjust treatment program, and complete documentation of the patient's progress. A strong educational emphasis is included delivered by a nurse educator and individual therapist. Patients are giving logs and a patient tool kit notebook that helps organize content from the core disciplines. A strong emphasis of cognitive behavioral therapy, mindfulness base stress reduction, and behavioral therapy is included. Relaxation training teaches patients various imagery and breathing exercises to calm the nervous system and decrease stress and tension in the body. Occupational therapy focuses on ergonomics, pacing, and instruction on Tai Chi and other mind body exercises. PT, in addition to standard strengthening, also initiates aerobic conditioning, and specialized exercises. Patients follow up 4 weeks after the program with the individual disciplines to monitor for compliance and make further adjustments in the patients home self-management program.

Swedish Pain Services monitors various outcomes using standard validated tools including patient visual analogue scale (VAS); Oswestry Disability Index; anxiety (GAD-7); depression (PHQ-9), catastrophizing (CPAQ); and 6-minute walk test (physical endurance). In a sample of 76 patients that competed programs, improvements were found across all measures at the conclusion of the program and at 4 weeks post-program. Statistically significant and clinically meaningful improvement were seen in VAS, ODI, GAD-7, PHG-9, 6-minute walk test, and sub-scores of the catastrophizing scale. Outcomes data has been recently published from similar programs at Cleveland Clinic and Mayo clinic, showing a sustained improvement in psychosocial functioning, and in the cases of opioid management, reduction in and elimination of opioids in selected patients_{2,3}.

2. How does the proposed project address the opioid crisis, particularly from a prevention standpoint?

Generally, the Project will address the need for more treatment and more treatment options for patients with Substance Use Disorder (SUD) in south Snohomish County. The Project will also provide additional capacity and options for patients suffering from chronic pain – a leading cause of the misuse of opioid pain medications. The latter additionally impacts the issue of prevention of addiction to these drugs directly, by providing coordinated and integrated services to patients at risk for misuse and addiction. The Project will have significant integration with Primary Care medical services provided by CHC at the Edmonds Clinic – and potentially with other Primary Care providers in the District as well.

CHC's Primary Care services can play a key role in addressing the opioid crisis – and by integrating pain management and SUD counselling and recovery to Primary Care – that role increases. Engagement with Primary Care can be a path to recovery from SUD and the ongoing access to medical, dental, behavioral health and pharmacy services are a stabilizing factor for people as they go through recovery. This includes Suboxone Medically-Assisted Therapy (MAT) for qualifying patients, which all non-pediatric physicians at CHC have been trained and waivered to provide.

Additionally, CHC has had an internal Opioid Oversight Committee (OOC) lead by Dr. Tom Tocher, CHC's Chief Clinical Officer, since 2015. The OOC charged with the responsibility to provide administrative and clinical guidance and support to CHC providers managing chronic pain patients. The OOC advises clinical staff on CHC pain management issues, monitors established pain management reports and reviews provider requests on chronic pain patient management. Beyond individual treatment goals for each patient, the OOC seeks to develop best practices in pain management and reduce the rate of high opioid utilization in our community.

The services provided by the Swedish Program will provide options for patients to prescription opioids in managing their chronic pain issues – and we will have the ability in this partnership to connect CHC OOC-managed patients directly with these services. Patients who are using opioid pain medications who wish to transition off of them will also be afforded options – thus further reducing dependency on these medications.

CHC will hire a Chemical Dependency Clinical Manager with funding from the Bureau of Primary Health Care (BPHC) as a permanent addition to our clinical staff if this Project is funded. This new FTE will help evolve and integrate CHC's services with those proposed in this new facility, with the goal of developing effective and replicable models and protocols for holistic patient care, including both prevention of addiction as well as recovery from it.

Further, CHC's Outreach Team is working with agencies as diverse as the SHAG Senior apartments and the Lynnwood Jail to develop protocols and systems for identifying and engaging individuals in Primary Care – as well as helping to connect and refer patients in imminent need of pain management and SUD treatment to providers and programs. This Project will greatly enhance those efforts to achieve more positive outcomes.
