Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, was called to order at 8:02 a.m. by President Knutsen.

Approval of Minutes

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the minutes of the regular board meeting on June 26, 2019.

Executive Committee Report

The committee met on July 17, 2019 to review the agendas for the July 24, 2019 board meeting and the September 5, 2019 special board meeting, and to discuss a personnel matter. No action was taken.

Superintendent Report

Dr. Fenn reported on the following items:

 AWPHD is in the process of hiring an Executive Director due to the death of Ben Lindekugel. Dr. Fenn met with the interim CEO for Snoqualmie Hospital District which is in the process of a merger with Overlake. Dr. Fenn told the interim CEO that if their commissioners were interested in meeting with the Verdant commissioners to contact Dr. Fenn directly and she will work with the Verdant board to schedule. - WSU and Swedish Edmonds will speak at the August 28, 2019 board meeting if the commissioners are still interested in hearing an update. All commissioners are still interested.
- The September 5, 2019 special board meeting will include strategic planning, Value Village plans, and staff input. Planning will be facilitated by Margot Helphand.
- Legislative Listening Session is set for August 3, 2019 at Verdant. Thanks to Commissioners Knutsen and Distelhorst for RSVP-ing.
- Dr. Fenn met with Town of Woodway Mayor Carla Nichols and the Woodway Public Works Department to view the walking trail. A ribbon cutting will occur in September 2019 and Mayor Nichols will confirm the date.
- 6. Mr. Kosovich has accepted a position with Skagit County Health working on housing issues. Dr. Fenn apologized to the Finance Committee that this was not known at their recent committee meeting. Commissioner Knutsen said that a transition plan will be put in to place.
- 7. Verdant Partner Roundtable on August 2, 2019 will include a farewell to Mr. Kosovich.

Finance Committee Report

The committee met on July 17, 2019. Ms. King reviewed the financial statements and cash activity for June 2019 (E:46:19).

Resolution 2019:04 Appointing District Treasurer

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Resolution 2019:04 appointing Ms. Daria Heimerman of Ash Consulting as the Treasurer of the District, providing for payment by the District of the bond premium, and removing the current treasurer, Mr. Kosovich.

Commissioner Langer inquired if the Resolution was vetted by Brad Berg. Ms. King indicated that it was the same template resolution used previously that Mr. Berg had drafted. Ms. Ash introduced Ms. Heimerman to the board with her qualifications. Commissioner Langer inquired if anyone else on staff has the finance experience to fulfill the treasurer role. Ms. King indicated that there is currently no one on staff with the necessary experience.

Authorization for Payment of Vouchers & Payroll

Warrant Numbers 13641 through 13715 for June 2019 for payment in the amount of \$119,147.41 were presented for approval (E:47:19) by Commissioner Langer. *Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve.*

Program Committee Update

The Program Committee met on July 17, 2019 to review three renewal program applications (E:48:19).

Commissioner Knowles asked if there were any known or perceived conflicts of interest and none were reported by the commissioners.

Mr. Kosovich provided an overview of the three programs that the Program Committee discussed and Commissioner Knowles provided the committee recommendations.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the Community Health Center of Snohomish County Dental Care Access for Uninsured Adults for two years at \$100,195 per year.

Commissioners discussed the idea of auditing select patient files to check for accountability of Verdant funding.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the Edmonds School District Family Resource Advocate for two years at \$180,000 per year.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve partial funding for the Center for Human Services Youth Counseling Program for two years at \$270,000 per year.

Update on Hunger & Health

Ms. Waldin provided an update on the Food Insecurity Nutrition Incentive (FINI) grant and the next steps for the Food Bank project (Exhibit E:49:19). Dr. Fenn acknowledged the work that Ms. Waldin did on this project.

RESOLUTION NO. 2019-04

A RESOLUTION of the Commission of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, Washington (the "District"), appointing and designating Daria Heimerman as the treasurer of the District and authorizing Wells Fargo, N.A., to honor his facsimile signature in that capacity; specifying the terms of the necessary surety bond; providing for payment by the District of the premium on such bond; and removing the current treasurer.

WHEREAS, pursuant to RCW 70.44.171 and Article III, Section 3, of the Amended and Restated Bylaws of the District (the "Bylaws"), the Commission is required to designate some person having experience in financial and fiscal matters as the treasurer of the District (the "Treasurer") subject to the requirement of an adequate surety bond with an authorized surety company; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 2011-05, adopted June 22, 2011, George Kosovich was designated Treasurer; and

WHEREAS, the Commission desires to appoint a new Treasurer; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Commission of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, Washington, as follows:

Section 1. Daria Heimerman, who is found to possess the necessary experience in financial and fiscal matters, is designated Treasurer to perform under the direction of the District's superintendent the duties set forth in Article III, Section 3, of the Bylaws with respect to all funds of the District, effective August 2, 2019, provided that such designee shall have by then obtained an adequate surety bond with a surety company authorized to do business in the State of Washington.

Section 2. Wells Fargo, N.A. (the "Bank"), as a designated depository of this municipal corporation, and its correspondent banks are hereby requested, authorized and directed to honor all checks and warrants drawn in the District's name on its respective accounts with the Bank (including those drawn to the individual order of any person or persons whose names appear thereon as signer or signers thereof) when bearing or purporting to bear the facsimile signature of the following:

DARIA HEIMERMAN, Treasurer,

and the Bank (including its correspondent banks) shall be entitled to honor and to charge this municipal corporation for all such checks and warrants regardless of by whom or by what means the actual or purported facsimile signature or signatures thereon may have been affixed thereto, if

such facsimile signature or signatures resemble the facsimile specimens from time to time filed with the Bank by the Secretary or other authorized officer of the District; and further that all previous authorizations for the signing and honoring of such checks and warrants for the payment of the money drawn on the Bank by the District are continued in full force and effect as amplified hereby; that this authority shall continue in force until notice in writing of its revocation shall have been given to and received by the Bank; and that all transactions aforesaid which previously have taken place are hereby confirmed and ratified.

Section 3. The surety bond referred to in Section 1 assuring that the Treasurer shall faithfully perform the duties of those offices, shall be deemed adequate if it is payable to the District in the amount of at least \$250,000, which the Commission finds will protect the District against loss. The premium on such bond shall be paid by the District as provided by RCW 70.44.171.

Section 4. George Kosovich is hereby removed as Treasurer of the District effective August 2, 2019. The Superintendent is authorized and directed to notify the Bank and other financial institutions in writing that George Kosovich has been removed as Treasurer of the District.



South County Walks offers another way to be active

On a cloudy Tuesday that looked as if rain was about to start any minute, a group of 16 people cheerfully set out for a walk around Edmonds as part of the South County Walks.

These hour-long walks are organized four times a week throughout the summer and end Sept. 30, skipping Labor Day weekend. They take place in various locations around Edmonds, Lynnwood, and Mountlake Terrace, said Jennifer Piplic, Verdant Health Commission's director of marketing and communications.

Sherry Ogur, a volunteer who helps lead the walks, said, "We have some folks that will be here every Tuesday but would never go to Mountlake Terrace because they don't drive or they don't have access ... and that's another really good reason for having four different locations."

There are 10 routes for the walks in Edmonds, which are chosen by the Edmonds Senior Center and the Edmonds Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services Department.

However, not all locations have different routes. On Monday evenings, the walks begin at the Verdant Community Wellness Center in Lynnwood, and people get used to walking the same route each week, Piplic said.

Michael Parker, a participant of the walks in Edmonds and Lynnwood, said he has found new routes in both cities. Previously, one of the walks went through the Edmonds Marsh, which he did not know existed, and he is looking forward to seeing what is in store in future walks.

Some people are motivated by incentives, Piplic said, so at each walk, participants receive a punch card, and once they have finished eight walks, can be entered to win one of four prizes that have been donated by local businesses. The winners will be chosen in the beginning of October.

The prizes are a Fitbit Alta donated by the Everett Clinic; a commuter prize pack that includes, among other items, an ORCA card donated by Community Transit; running or walking shoes donated by Brooks Outlet Store; and hiking shoes and a Discover Pass donated by Althea's Footwear Solutions and IRG Physical Therapy.

While Karen Ash recently started participating in the South County Walks, she said the punch cards have been a good incentive for her to continue the walks.

"We were in Mountlake Terrace this weekend, looking at all the yards and all the different houses and the different neighborhoods; it made the walk really fast and enjoyable," Ash said. "We would never be in those areas otherwise."

Piplic said, "(The Verdant Health Commission) got involved because we wanted to create more opportunities for residents in this area to the outdoors and be active outside and connect with one another and meet new folks."

Diane Moss, who participated in the South County Walks last summer, said they are a great way to meet others. After they ended last year, she continued to walk with one of the women she met through them.

The walks start on Tuesday mornings at 9:30 at the Olympic Beach Visitor Station in Edmonds. On Thursdays at 6 p.m., they begin at the Lynnwood Recreation Center. The walks meet at the Mountlake Terrace Recreation Pavilion Saturdays at 9:30 a.m. On Monday evenings at 6, the walks start at the Verdant Community Wellness Center.

The Verdant Health Commission, with the Cities of Edmonds, Lynnwood, and Mountlake Terrace, and the Edmonds Senior Center, organizes South County Walks, Piplic said.

The Verdant Health Commission also organizes the Bike2Health South County Rides with Cascade Bicycle Club, said Marielle Harrington, healthy communities coordinator with the City of Lynnwood.

These are weekly bicycle rides intended for beginning riders over 6 years old with basic bike skills and for families. They end in August with one ride in September in each city.

So far, not many people have shown up for the rides, but Harrington said they hope it is because school has recently ended.

"We're really trying to get more bike riders in our communities. We know the benefits of being physically active, and this is really one component of encouraging people to be active," Harrington said.

The bicycle rides in July and August are from 5-7 p.m. Tuesdays at Veterans Memorial Park, 5-7 p.m. Wednesdays at South Lynnwood Park, and 5-7 p.m. Thursdays at Edmonds City Park. To register or for more information, visit https://cascade.org/bike2health.
