March 2012 Program Oversight Committee Summary

Summary of March Applications

- One revised application from Providence Hospice & Home Care Foundation
- Five new applications received:
 - o Four address Education & Empowerment
 - Three address Prevention
 - One addresses Access to Healthcare
 - One addresses Public Policy & Advocacy

Programs Recommended for Funding

- Providence Hospice & Home Care Foundation: After further discussion with Providence Hospice, the
 committee recommends partial funding of a revised request that includes additional outreach and
 education on hospice services. The partial funding would cover half (4 hours a week) of the physician
 educator expenses requested in the proposal along with a half-time nurse to educate the public, physicians,
 and conduct outreach through community organizations in our district. The committee would like to see
 clear outcome measures on outreach included in the funding agreement. The funding recommendation is
 \$155,000 per year for three years.
- Lynnwood Food Bank Improve Nutrition: The goal of the project is to increase consumption of nutritious food by food bank customers. Funds would be used to translate simple recipes and nutrition information into 5 languages and to provide fresh food ingredients with recipes. The committee is recommending funding at \$1,200 on a one-time basis.
- YWCA Children's Domestic Violence Program: An in-home, therapeutic support program for child victims of
 domestic violence and their non-abusive caregivers. Funding would also support additional adult mental
 health counseling for domestic violence victims in our district. The committee is recommending funding at
 \$25,000 per year for three years.
- Edmonds Senior Center, Healthy Living Fair: A health fair on April 27 that will provide an estimated 600 seniors with information and health screenings from 60 vendors. Verdant would be recognized as the title/platinum sponsor. The committee is recommending funding at \$2,000 on a one-time basis.

Programs For Additional Review

• **TeamChild Community Advocacy Project:** A project targeting system changes in the education, mental health, and juvenile justice systems. The committee is seeking clarification on the proposal and will bring the group in for a Q&A to learn more about TeamChild's experience in successfully advocating for policy changes and get more specific information about the goals of the project.

Programs Not Recommended for Funding

• **City of Lynnwood, International Farmers Market:** The City of Lynnwood is requesting seed funding for the first two seasons of an International Farmers Market with the goal of increasing access to nutritious food. The committee did not feel that there was a strong enough connection between supporting a farmers market and Verdant's health priorities and mission.

A resolution of the Commission of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, Washington (the "District"), approving incentive compensation for the superintendent of the District for 2011; approving the terms and conditions of an amendment to the employment agreement with the superintendent of the District; and authorizing the execution, delivery and performance of such amendment on behalf of the District.

WHEREAS, the Commission previously approved and adopted the goals and objectives for the Superintendent for calendar year 2011 (the "2011 Goals"); and

WHEREAS, the Commission has reviewed the Superintendent's performance in 2011 and evaluated the extent to which he has met the 2011 Goals;

WHEREAS, the Commission further wishes to recognize the Superintendent's performance by increasing his base compensation; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Commission of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, Washington, as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. The Commission hereby finds that the Superintendent has achieved the 2011 Goals to the satisfaction of the Commission.

Section 2. The Commission hereby approves and authorizes the payment to the Superintendent of incentive compensation for his performance in 2011 in the amount of \$______, which amount shall be paid the Superintendent on or before April 1, 2012.

Section 3. After due consideration, and being fully advised, the terms and conditions set forth in the First Amendment to the Employment Agreement are found to be in the best interests of the District and in the public interest, and accordingly the same are hereby approved and accepted, and the President of the Commission is authorized and directed to properly execute and deliver the agreement to Mr. Zapora on behalf of the District in substantially the form presented to the Commission and on file in the District's offices. The President of the Commission of the District is

further authorized and directed to do, or cause to be done, all things reasonable and necessary in order to fully and timely perform the agreement in accordance with its terms.
