Call to Order The Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners of

Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, was called to order at 8:00 a.m. by President Knutsen.

Approval of Minutes Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously

to approve the minutes of the regular board meeting

on April 25, 2018.

Executive

**Committee Report** 

The committee met on May 16, 2018 to review the agenda for the May 23, 2018 board meeting and to discuss the financial audit and programs. No action

was taken.

Superintendent Report Superintendent Fenn reported on the following items:

- 1. Thanks to Commissioner Knutsen for attending the May 4, 2018 Verdant Partner Roundtable.
- 2. Leadership Snohomish County honored Mr. Kosovich at their recent graduation with the Kaleidoscope award.

- 3. CHART (CHronic Utilizer Alternative Response Team) is currently working on their legal agreements.
- Association of Washington Public Hospital Districts (AWPHD) is holding its annual conference from June 23 to 27, 2018 in Chelan, WA. Dr. Fenn will attend this conference and will miss the June 27<sup>th</sup> board meeting. Dr. Fenn invited commissioners to attend this conference.
- 5. The RFP for the Building Healthy Communities Fund has been released. An information session will occur on Tuesday, June 5, 2018 at Verdant.
- 6. The board will hold a mini retreat on Wednesday, June 13, 12 to 4 p.m. at Verdant. Topics to be discussed include Value Village, timeline for commissioner appointment for the position that Commissioner Williams will vacate at the end of July 2018, and possible discussion with other community elected officials.
  - Dr. Fenn asked for confirmation that there would be a quorum for the retreat and Commissioners Knowles, Knutsen, Williams and Wilson responded in the affirmative.
- 7. Thank you to Ms. King for her work with Moss Adams on the 2017 financial audit.
- 8. Ms. Huber presented at the UW Bothell Nursing & Public Health event along with DJ Wilson from State of Reform.

#### Moss Adams 2017 Financial Statements

Ms. Mary Wright and Mr. Matthew Stopa of Moss Adams presented the 2017 financial audit (E:39:18) and noted that there was a 6.3% increase in assets and a 1% decrease in liabilities from 2016 to 2017. As of December 31, 2017, the District had a net position of \$88.1 million, operating revenue of \$11.9 million, \$5.5 million in program expenditures, and a decrease from \$10.9 million in operating expenses to \$9.5 million. The District received an unqualified opinion and there were no major audit adjustments or concerns.

## Finance Committee Report

The committee met on May 15, 2018. Ms. King reviewed the financial statements and cash activity for April 2018 (E:40:18).

Ms. King stated that Verdant will be liquidating the Payden & Rydel US Government mutual fund in May

and moving to individual securities to comply with RCW 39.50.040.

#### Authorization for Payment of Vouchers & Payroll

Warrant Numbers 12841 through 12876 for April 2018 for payment in the amount of \$77,344.16 were presented for approval (E:41:18). *Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve.* 

#### Resolution 2018:5 Fixed Asset Disposition

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Resolution 2018:05 approving the surplus of fixed assets.

## Program Committee Update

The Program Committee met on May 16, 2018 to review three new requests for funding, two renewal requests, and the Building Healthy Communities Fund application update (E:42:18).

Commissioner Knowles asked if there were any conflicts of interest. No conflicts of interest were reported by the commissioners present.

Mr. Kosovich presented the requests and Commissioner Knowles presented the committee recommendations to the board.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the Project Access Northwest South Snohomish County Access to Healthcare in the amount of \$125,000 per year for three years.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the Back to School Health & Resource Fair in the amount of \$12,000. This is the same level as 2017 funding.

Commissioners discussed the three requests that were not recommended for funding including the Northshore Senior Center transportation program, the Grace Medical Institute Sharing Healthcare Burdens, and the Courtney Miller PLLC Mindful Self Compassion Program. Dr. Fenn and Mr. Kosovich will pull a group together to work on ideas for long-term solutions to the transportation issues which the Northshore Senior Center requested. This issue may be revisited at a future board meeting. Dr. Fenn and Ms. Waldin will look into a Verdant Community Wellness Center program to address the need for programs to reduce burnout in health and human services providers.

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#### Building Healthy Communities Fund Update

Application are due by June 29, 2018. An information session will be held at Verdant on June 5, 2018 at 3 p.m. and all commissioners are invited to attend this session.

#### Verdant Community Wellness Center Activities Update

Ms. Waldin presented an update on activities at the Wellness Center in May 2018 (E:43:18). The board is invited to attend the Hunger & Health Stakeholder Discussion with Food Lifeline on May 31, 2018 at Verdant.

#### Verdant Multicultural Report

Ms. Huber presented an update on multicultural activities for May 2018 (E:44:18) and invited the board to attend the Hope & Health Wellness Fair on Saturday, June 2, 2018, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Community Life Center in Lynnwood.

#### **Marketing Report**

Ms. Piplic presented the Marketing report (E:45:18) with an update on Bike2Health. Mountlake Terrace and Edmonds are wrapping up construction on the bike lanes and moving to community education this summer and fall.

#### **Public Comments**

Mr. Gary Renville & Ms. Melissa Johnson of Project Access Northwest thanked the board for the funding. They noted that there are currently 1,800 specialists in their network, and they have served almost 50,000 people in Snohomish County. They offered their support if Verdant ever needs a voice from the community.

Dr. Fenn commented that HB 2539-2017-18 goes into effect as an RCW during the 1st week of June 2018. She is in meetings with Washington State University Medical School on a potential partnership for clinical research projects.

## Commissioner Comments

Commissioner Knutsen commented that the tough conversations that the board has from time to time are good to have.

Call to Order

The Special Meeting of the Board of Commissioners

was called to order by President Knutsen at 12:07 p.m.

Conversation with Stakeholders on Community Health

Issues

Superintendent Fenn began the discussion by asking the guests from the cities of Lynnwood, Edmonds & Mountlake Terrace to share their perspectives on health and wellness issues currently facing their

communities.

Mayor Earling encouraged the commissioners to consider the economic growth and development impact on any development of the Value Village

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property. He provided an overview of the City of Edmonds Highway 99 Subarea Plan (E:46:18) and noted that there are no height restrictions for the Value Village parcel. He would like to see the building scale well with the hospital and include mixed use residential and commercial which could include a hotel, exercise facility, medical office space, a community gathering place and a healthy restaurant.

Chief Compaan stated that, in addition to Mayor Earling's ideas, there is a need for a space where individuals can be housed while they are being connected to services. He noted that the police are collaborating on the ChART project in South Snohomish County and it often takes time to get people into services like substance use treatment and there is currently no safe option for police to leave people awaiting services.

Chief Davis agreed with Chief Compaan and noted that their shared police social worker is now working with 80+ clients. The goal of the program is not to identify more clients and add resources—instead they want to see those clients making progress.

Mayor Smith said homelessness is not necessarily the problem—it is a symptom of other community issues. She stated we need to stop the bleed. For example, every 11 hours there is a reported domestic violence (DV) incident in Lynnwood (these are just the reported cases). There is no DV shelter in South Snohomish County. We also need to do more early intervention and prevention work with youth to keep them out of the justice system. We need more affordable housing with prevention and drug treatment options.

Councilmember Tietzel shared information about the City of Edmonds work on homeless and opioids. The city has set aside \$250,000 on each issue and is currently working with a consultant on a needs assessment for homelessness. He said there is a need to help people develop life skills so they can maintain stability once housed.

City Manager Scott Hugill recommended that Verdant keep the Value Village parcel under its control. He suggested more prevention programs focused on issues like reducing substance use in schools. He noted that the Value Village site is a good fit for a treatment facility in South Snohomish County. He suggested we talk to our legislators about allowing governments to work with faith communities on projects that support housing and services. He would like Verdant to act as a clearinghouse for health information in Snohomish County.

Commissioner Knutsen noted that Verdant does have geographical boundaries and is limited to working on health and wellness issues. Housing would be a challenge for us to fund. She asked the guests if they have heard if our programming efforts in mental health are making a difference in the community.

Chief Compaan replied that he may not be the best person to ask and that it is difficult to prove that something is not happening as a result of our prevention work. He said, however, that community needs are increasing.

Paul Krauss shared information about the City of Lynnwood's Human Services Commission and its experience providing funding to community organizations.

Patrick Doherty shared information about the HWY 99 area plan and distributed copies. He discussed a holistic approach to creating healthy communities including diversity, walkability, recreation, housing, transit and schools.

Mayor Earling stated that we need to advocate for a proactive solution to the mental health crisis.

Commissioner Williams shared research showing that American life expectancy is decreasing compared to other developed nations (E:47:18). Opioids are thought to be a leading cause of this trend.

Commissioner Knowles asked for clarification about what the cities have done so far to support programs

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like a diversion center. He also asked about successful models of collaboration. Chief Compaan referenced Dawson Place as a strong model of collaboration. Superintendent Fenn noted that the board packets include examples from Akron, OH, Spokane, WA and Honolulu, HI. All South Snohomish County communities are currently facing the same issues including homelessness, drugs, and the need for a diversion-type center in south county (E:48:18). Services for aging populations and youth mental health were important to all three cities

as well.

The Value Village lease will end in 2021 with a oneyear out clause and bonds will be paid back by December 2020. Current bonding capacity is estimated at \$29 million (E:49:18)

Commissioners discussed pros and cons of selling the Value Village property rather than building on it. They also discussed the property as a potential hotel-next-to-hospital concept, a domestic violence shelter, or medical-related housing. Commissioner Knusten reminded the board that Verdant is quickly outgrowing the Community Wellness Center in Lynnwood.

The board authorized Superintendent Fenn to engage with a broker to look for other potential land in the district that could be used for a diversion center or domestic violence shelter. Commissioners also requested an updated property appraisal of the Value Village site. Findings will be presented at the September 2018 regular board meeting.

#### Process for Filling Commissioner Positions

Commissioner Williams will remain in the district until July 27, 2018, with his last board meeting on July 25, 2018.

A timeline for filling the position (E:50:18) was presented. Commissioner Wilson will not be available for the September 26 board meeting so a special evening meeting will need to be scheduled for candidate interviews. The board agreed to interview the top three candidates.

How to handle possible conflicts of interest by candidates was discussed.

Commissioner Knutsen shared that Commissioner Williams will be hard to replace. She expressed interest

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> in candidates with clinical backgrounds and noted that we will want to be aware of any potential conflicts of interest.

There was discussion about the fact that the person appointed would need to run for election in 2019 if they wanted to continue in the role for the duration of the term.

The group agreed that a letter and resume sent to jobs@verdanthealth.org are appropriate submissions for interested candidates.
