Call to Order

The Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners of Public Hospital District No. 2, Snohomish County, was called to order at 8:00 a.m. by President Knutsen.

Approval of Minutes

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve the minutes of the regular board meeting on January 24, 2018.

Superintendent Report Superintendent Fenn reported on the following items:

1. March 2018 calendar (E:11:18) highlights the March 12th Verdant Healthier Community Conference, the March 14th board study session, and the March 28th regular board meeting. Other events for March include Understanding Student Homelessness by the Housing Consortium of Everett & Snohomish County on March 8th, 7:30 to 9 a.m., Supporting Immigrants in Accessing Health Care on March 9th at Verdant from 1 to 3 p.m., Verdant's quarterly Resource Connector meeting on March 13th at Verdant from 8 to 9:30 a.m., and the Hero's Café on March 27th at Verdant from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Dr. Fenn asked for commissioner feedback on the value of the calendar as a planning tool.

- 2. There were approximately 100 in attendance at the Hero's Café on February 27th. The group acknowledged Ms. Waldin for her support.
- 3. Value Village binder list of proposed contents (E:12:18). Please give any additional items to Dr. Fenn
- 4. Status of HB 2539-2017-18 the bill is moving forward in the House. It had gone back to the Senate where Representative Strom Peterson testified in favor of the bill.
- 5. Verdant Healthier Community Conference keynote speaker was at the AWPHD conference in June 2017 and is excellent. Commissioners will introduce workshop speakers and participate in the lunch-time awards ceremony and photos.
- 6. The Lynnwood Police Chief spoke with Dr. Fenn about several cities which are exploring policy about safe injection sites and suggested that Verdant may be asked for its position on this topic at a later date.
- 7. Commissioner Williams and Dr. Fenn participated in a discussion about the WSU Medical School in Everett and a possible future partnership. Commissioner Williams will discuss this topic further at the March 14th study session. Dr. Fenn also suggested bringing Larry Schecter, who provides oversite of clinical programs at WSU, to the March 28th board meeting to meet the commissioners. Commissioner Langer expressed his excitement about a potential partnership. Commissioner Wilson asked that the presentation by Larry Schecter include who WSU has partnered with in our district.

Resolution 2018:01 Approve Amended Bylaws Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Resolution 2018:01 approving the Amended Bylaws of the District.

Resolution 2018:02 Approve 2018 Board Meeting & Retreat Schedule Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Resolution 2018:02 approving the 2018 board meeting and retreat schedule.

Executive Committee

President Knutsen reported that the Executive Committee met on February 21, 2018 to review and approve the February 28, 2018 board meeting agenda

> and discuss personnel matters and property acquisition. No action was taken.

Finance Committee Report

The committee met on February 21, 2018. Ms. King reviewed the financial statements and cash activity for January 2018 (E:13:18).

Authorization for Payment of Vouchers & Payroll

Warrant Numbers 12661 through 12709 for January 2018 for payment in the amount of \$71,857.08 were presented for approval (E:14:18). *Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve.*

Resolution 2018:03 Approve Surplus of Fixed Assets

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve Resolution 2018:03 approving the surplus of fixed assets.

Program Committee Update

The Program Committee met on February 21, 2018 to review one new request from the Washington Poison Center and one request to re-allocate unspent funds from Homage Senior Services on Health Homes Project (E:15:18). Commissioner Knowles reported a conflict of interest with the request from Homage Senior Services and will recuse himself from the discussion as he is employed by a managed care organization. No conflicts of interest were reported by the other commissioners present.

Mr. Kosovich presented the requests and Commissioner Knowles presented the committee recommendations on the Washington Poison Center to the board while Mr. Kosovich presented on the Homage Senior Services request.

Applications Recommended for Funding:

Washington Poison Center – request for \$26,080 in Year 1 and \$27,588 in Year 2 for the development and implementation of a marijuana education and prevention program reaching 200 South County individuals who interact with parents.

Motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to approve \$26,080 in year 1 and \$27,588 in Year 2.

Applications Not Recommended for Funding:

Homage Senior Services – a request to apply \$25,000 of unspent funds from the Care Coordination Program to the Health Homes start-up. Program Committee initially

did not recommend the funding. Commissioner Wilson shared that she felt the request was appropriate because there was a clear need and funds would go to an established non-profit partner. Commissioners discussed further and decided to approve the funding with follow-up results to the board at a later date. *Motion was made, seconded and passed with one abstention to approve* \$25,000 of unspent funds from Homage Senior Service's Care Transition Program to Homage Senior Service's Health Homes Program.

Verdant Community Wellness Center Activities Update

Mr. Kosovich presented an update on activities at the Wellness Center in February 2018 (E:16:18).

Verdant Multicultural Report

Mr. Kosovich presented an update on multicultural activities for February 2018 (E:17:18).

Commissioner Williams asked about the 2nd field at Edmonds-Woodway. Mr. Kosovich explained that Verdant funded Phase 1 of the project and that Phase 2 has not happened yet due to funding and that there is a moratorium on crumb rubber by the City of Edmonds.

Commissioner Langer left the call at 8:45 a.m.

Marketing Report

Ms. Piplic presented the Marketing report (E:18:18) with a schedule for the March 12, 2018 Verdant Healthier Community Conference. Four awards will be presented at lunch. With speaker agreement, Verdant will look in to videotaping the morning keynote speaker and making the video available to share.

Verdant received dividends payments of \$69,740 offset by a unrealized loss of \$309,381 on our investment portfolio in January which closed with an ending market value of \$42,796,722.

Program grant commitments total \$5,651,603 and \$2,808,810 for 2018 and 2019 respectively. \$1,338,397 remains available to spend in 2018, \$50,000 of which is designated as Superintendent Discretionary.

Revenue of \$117,158 and expenses of \$90,925 from the Kruger Clinic were incurred, netting to an additional operating income of \$26,233 in January.

Program Description: In December, Verdant renewed Homage Senior Service's Care Transition Program. The previously funded Care Coordination program is expected to have \$25,000 in unspent funds, which Homage has proposed applying to the development of a Health Homes (HH) program. The HH program is designed for residents that have Medicaid or Medicaid/Medicare aka dual coverage. Referrals for the program come from HH lead agencies (including Managed Care Organizations) to contracted providers. HH eligible clients must have one or more chronic conditions such as diabetes, heart disease, or a mental health condition, and must be at risk for a second chronic condition, based on their medical history.

Homage would work with Northwest Regional Council (NWRC), a HH Care Coordination Lead Agency for North Sound and Homage would fulfill referrals in the South County zip codes. There are an estimated 714 eligible individuals in South County that Homage would seek to serve through the program.

Expected Results	The goal would be to serve at least 50-55 individuals in the ramp up period (< 6 months). The program includes well-defined engagement and health measures.
Use of Funds & Costs	Funds would be used for direct service salaries of Homage staff for the program while it reaches scale. The HH program contracts through NWRC would then provide performance-based payments to Homage as it met the program goals.

Program Committee Recommendations

Applications Recommended for Funding

1. Washington Poison Center: the committee is recommending the project for funding as requested.

Although the project does not connect to a top Verdant priority, it does address both health education and prevention priorities. The program also would specifically reach Verdant's service area by partnering to train South County service providers.

Applications Not Recommended for Funding

- 2. Homage Senior Services Health Homes Start-up: the committee discussed the request in both January and February and there was not interest in rolling the unspent funds into a Health Homes Start-up. There were two primary reasons:
 - a. There are several other organizations operating HH programs in the larger region. There are at least 5 Care Coordination Organizations operating in Snohomish County and that would have interest in starting up programs. It is hard to justify Verdant choosing one HH program provider over another.
 - b. Committee members did not feel it was Verdant's role to support the start-up of a WA Health Care Authority program, or in supporting care coordination services that could be provided by Managed Care Organizations.

February 2018 Multicultural Program & Outreach Report

- Continuation of the 7-week session of Spanish Language Cooking Matters for Diabetes. This is a free 6-week bilingual course that teaches adults at risk of diabetes how to buy and prepare low cost healthy meals. Participants shared pictures of their healthier choices and dishes have shared pictures of their meals made at home using the tools and ingredients they've learned about in class. The final number of families impacted and reporting positive experiences in modifying their nutrition by participating in this program was 13.
- Continuation of the 7-week Spanish Language Strengthening Families Program for Parents and Youth 10-14 years. The Strengthening Families Program is geared towards parents and youth 10-14 is a family skills training intervention designed to enhance school success and reduce youth substance use and aggression among 10- to 14-yearolds. Current participation is 12 families with 18 youth.

Upcoming program:

Cooking with Cops: As an extension of the Verdant Health Commission focus on health and wellness, the purpose of the Cooking with LPD Cops program is to create a sense of community and build trust and relationships between law enforcement and residents with an emphasis on nutrition education. It is a program that would pair Lynnwood Police Officers with diverse, interested and (potentially) at-risk youth from the Edmonds school district in an effort to positively change the culture and create positive interactions among young people and police. The program is scheduled to start on Spring Break- April 2nd.
